

## Summer Planning & Homework

As the end of the school year approaches it's time to reflect on students' accomplishments and think about what students need to do to help prepare themselves for future endeavors.

As a high school student you get a lot of advice on how to be successful. Some may say that students need to get involved in different activities, plan for the future, get good grades, and study hard. It can be

overwhelming. Below are items that should be considered by students and parents to make preparing for post secondary a little easier.

- Continue to review the four-year plan each year, making adjustments as necessary.
- Plan for college credit and AP courses when available. College credit earned in high school is free in most cases and if your student is ready, it is a great way to get a jump-start on a college degree.
- Sophomore year look into taking the ACT Plan Test.
- Begin linking career interests to the education and training required. Begin researching colleges that offer the education and skill training required for those careers.
- Have your student develop a budget for himself or herself, including spending plans and goals for the future. Reinforce savings before spending and start talking about the student's responsibility for college costs.
- Junior year take the ACT test as part of the admission process for college.
- Talk about college financing and create a plan to pay for college, identifying how much each family member will be contributing. Develop a budget to help determine how much your family can afford for college tuition.
  - 1. Who's paying the bills?
  - 2. Where will spending money come from?
  - 3. Are there spending limits?
  - 4. Are credit cards part of the plan?
- Layout family expectations for college early so there are no surprises.
- What are your grade expectations and what are the consequences if those expectations are not met?
- Is a car going to campus? Whose car and when can it be used?

Success in high school leads to success later in life whether you choose going to college or choosing to go into a career.

## Saydel Food & Nutrition Director Jessy Sadler Honored as Public Health Leader

The Iowa Department of Public Health (IDPH) recognized leaders in nutrition and physical activity at a ceremony held April 11, 2017, at the 2017 Iowa Governor's Conference on Public Health in Des Moines. The honorees emulate the IDPH Bureau of Nutrition and Health Promotion vision of "an Iowa where healthy living is accessible, valued and supported by all." The winners must strive to make the bureau's mission a reality by "ensuring that Iowans have the opportunity to live a healthy lifestyle by providing education and resources, building partnerships and supporting communities."

Jessy Sadler of Saydel Community Schools was awarded the Nutrition and Physical Activity Emerging Leader award. "I love my work," Jessy stated. "It entails a great variety of tasks which



makes it challenging and rewarding at the same time. It's my responsibility to keep up with the changing federal regulations and be a support system to provide my staff with the training and tools to succeed in their daily work. My goal is to ensure all of our food and wellness programs run with integrity and operate within the codes and regulations. We want to be doing our diligence to provide the highest quality meals we can to students."

Jessy is an innovator in the school setting, making connections between food service and physical education to create a school environment focused on wellness. She works with students, parents and teachers to identify new and creative approaches to promote healthy living in the district. This has included providing healthy foods to students in place of traditional snacks, providing health-related prizes in place of food rewards, and collaborating to provide new after school physical activity opportunities. Additionally, she has championed healthy choices for elementary school parties and ensuring access to drinking water for middle and high school students. Jessy's work aligns with the Bureau of Nutrition and Health Promotion's mission and vision by building partnerships and creating an environment where healthy living is accessible and supported. She has engaged students in her work to create champions within the school, worked with parents to create innovation and partners with teachers for district support. As the district director of food and nutrition, Jessy goes beyond the legal requirements and attempts to meet them in a way that promotes heathy living. ## Vaccinations Needed All 12th Graders Need Meningococcal Vaccine

The Iowa Department of Public Health has made changes to the Iowa immunization law for the start of the 2017-18 school year. This change requires that all students entering 12th grade have the Meningococcal vaccine before school starts this fall. All students entering 12th grade must have proof of having the Meningococcal vaccine **before school starts in August**, unless the student has a Certificate of Immunization Exemption.

Meningococcal disease is a life threatening illness that is caused by bacteria that infects the brain, blood, and spinal cord. It easily spreads in crowded settings and typically affects older teens and young adults.

There will be <u>no</u> grace/extension period for the implementation of this requirement. Now is a great time for your child to receive these immunization requirements and beat the back-to-school rush by making an appointment for your incoming 12th grader.
