Principal's Message

During parent teacher conferences this past week, I was speaking with a student and her mom. We were discussing classes for her senior year. I found myself in a conversation that I frequently have with students. I was passionately describing the need to view the years in high school as time to prepare for life. "This is the time to challenge yourself because now is when you need to prepare for when there is less support." I continued by sharing, "We spoke about taking AP Government last year and this would be a great way to challenge yourself."

This is an example of one of the many courses that we have added over the past several years as a way to better prepare students for life after high

school. In this newsletter you will find information about the AP classes we offer on our campus. Students can earn college credit for each of these classes by earning a qualifying score on the AP tests taking place this spring.

AP courses are one way we have increased choices to challenge students. We have also made a concerted effort to match other courses to skills and knowledge students need after high school. We have implemented courses with a focus on healthcare, restaurant management, entrepreneurial skills, and skilled trades.

As you engage in conversations with your student about life after high school, I encourage you to emphasize the importance of taking on challenges while in high school. These are the challenges that will play a huge role in helping ensure your student is prepared for post-secondary options. Here are a couple things to consider as you engage in these conversations with your student. First, have a realistic understanding of your child's capabilities. Second, have an understanding of the demands these challenges place on your child. The best way to do this is to become educated about opportunities through conversations with teachers, coaches and administrators. AP Opportunities at Saydel High School

AP Biology, Mr. Justin Blake

In AP Biology, we delve into concepts and laboratory methods more deeply to prepare students for college level expectations. The lab activities that we engage with in class will give students transferrable skills and real experiences to draw from. Meanwhile, high expectations for lab reports and

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other written assignments help students develop communication skills that will aid them in college and beyond. By challenging students to do more with their knowledge and skills and helping them develop high expectations for themselves, we prepare students for what comes next.

AP Spanish Culture and Civilization, Mrs. Cheryl Smith

AP Spanish Culture and Civilization is equivalent to a third-year college course in Advanced Spanish language skills. We speak almost exclusively Spanish and use authentic materials from many countries. A significant portion of the course prepares students to speak and write on academic topics. Among the topics we examine are: how borders and walls artistically reflect the culture of a place, what roles outside forces play in forming a personal identity, how geography plays a part in a culture's food and traditions, global responsibilities in the face of injustice, the influence a family can play in personal and romantic relationships, and how technology shapes and reflects culture and many more topics.

AP Government, Ms. Ashley Gilles

AP Government and Politics will prepare students for college by teaching them how to engage in civic dialogue, gain a perspective on government and politics in the United States and an ability to interpret our government. Some topics that will be covered in our class are constitutional underpinnings, public policy, civil rights and liberties and more. This class prepares the students for college and the "real world" by giving them the information they need to be well-informed American citizens.

AP English Language and Composition, Mrs. Kari Fokken

Critical reading and reasoning skills have become perhaps more vital than they have ever been in our lifetimes. AP English Language and Composition is designed to teach the skills students will need to succeed in a college-level writing course and to act as critically reasoning citizens in a democratic society. This year we will work together to discuss and analyze writing as well as develop students' ability to craft an argument, synthesize sources, and conduct research at an advanced level. We will also cultivate media literacy by studying the rhetoric of visual media through art, photos, commercials (print and video), documentary films, and political cartoons. Students enrolled in the course will earn credit for Composition 105 through DMACC and have the potential to earn more credit by taking the AP English Language & Composition exam in May.

AP Studio Art, Mrs. Lindsay Dew

The AP Studio Art course is a rigorous and focused study in 2D art where originality, style and creativity shine through. Students will develop a quality portfolio that demonstrates a mastery of concept, composition and execution in drawing, painting and mixed media. This course is based on art students creating a body of 24 pieces of work that demonstrates quality, concentration and breadth. This portfolio will be submitted to the College Board for possible college credit. In the past, AP Studio Art participants held a high passing rate percentage with an outstanding showcase of work for not only this course but for application to college scholarships, as well.


Fundamentals of Reading

Saydel High School Guidance Update

October and November can be very busy months in the lives of seniors preparing for college. If seniors have not yet scheduled college campus visits, they definitely need to get on campuses to see what colleges have to offer and to see if it is a good fit. After visiting campuses, seniors should begin submitting admission applications to the colleges that they are most interested in.

Also, it's important to be aware of application deadlines. It is best to have all applications submitted to colleges by December 1. Students should make sure that they have filled out the FAFSA starting October 1 and be aware of the priority deadlines that each college has to ensure that they are eligible for different scholarship opportunities. If seniors need to take or retake the ACT, they will have one more opportunity December 9 with the registration deadline of November 3.

Sign up for DMACC classes

It's that time of year for juniors and seniors to sign up to take DMACC classes for the spring semester. This is a great opportunity for students to get a head start on the whole college experience plus it's free to students! Students can start taking core college courses now and can begin their college career. Currently, we have 48 students taking a total of 84 classes which comes to a total of at lest 222 college credits. The deadline for enrollment is Friday, November 17. Students may schedule an appointment the guidance office.

FAFSA Completion

I would like to remind parents that they are able to complete the 2018 FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) form. The national program is restructuring and providing more control to individual state programs. This year FAFSA Ready lowa will hold events from October 1, 2017 through March 1 2018, working within the new financial aid timeline. Listed below are the locations, and times.

Breakfast is available to *all* students at Saydel High School. Make sure your child is participating so that they can grow to their fullest potential.

At breakfast, we are required to offer four components:

- 1-2 ounce equivalent servings of bread/grain
- ½ cup serving of fruit
- ½ cup serving of 100% juice
- Milk

Students are required to take a serving of a fruit to be counted as a reimbursable meal.



Offer vs. serve at breakfast requires students to take 3 of the 4 components. At minimum, we can count a breakfast as reimbursable if a student takes either milk or one 4 oz. juice serving with a combination of the bread/grain and meat components. Without being charged for an extra item, students can take a carton of milk, 4 oz. juice/fruit and a combination of the bread/grain and meat components.

Example 1 of a Reimbursable Breakfast:

Whole Grain Pancakes, ½ cup fruit, and a carton of milk

Example 2 of a Reimbursable Breakfast:

Cereal (1oz container), 1 piece of toast or 1 package of graham crackers, 1 carton of milk, and ½ cup of fruit.

All of our kitchen staff are trained to ensure that each tray holds a reimbursable meal!
