Saydel Families & Community:

A nother school year is upon us; I hope this message finds you well. The purpose of our summer communicator is to preview the exciting developments in the upcoming year. In past editions of the Communicator you have learned about the exciting new programs and opportunities we are bringing to our students. You have also read about the success these new opportunities have generated in the areas of academic achievement and student engagement. This

issue of the Communicator will be no different. We have a number of exciting enhancements to our programming in the coming year.

I would like to take this opportunity to frame the reason behind these reforms and enhancements. Schools provide a connected experience for our community. We all have differing life experiences, but all of us have experienced K-12 school systems at one point in our life. This often makes us ask "why all the changes?" The education community is responsible not only for making reforms and enhancements to our systems, but for communicating the "why?" of the reform. Often the "why?" is related to changes in the law. Recent major examples of sweeping reform related to changes in the law include:

- 1. Implementation of the Iowa Core Curriculum.
- 2. The Early Literacy Initiative which requires summer programming for all non-proficient readers in grades K-3 with a legal requirement to retain non-proficient fourth grade students in 2018.
- 3. The Teacher Leadership and Compensation System.
- 4. Moving from the Iowa Assessments to a new state assessment system in 2018.

Often times the above legal requirements are given as a reason for change. However, our desire to improve and reform our schools goes beyond legal requirements. We have a social and moral responsibility to create school systems that meet the needs of every student.

In each of my Communicator articles this year, I will include some things our staff considers when making educational reform. I think it is important for the community to understand the "why?" in the school reform process. As I previously mentioned, regardless of when we were in school, we all share the school experience and often wonder why certain reforms are being made when reforms represent significant departures from our experiences.



The following chart shows a trend in routine vs. non-routine demands of occupations.

This illustration shows an increased need for students, regardless of job sector to be flexible in their thinking and interactions with others. This involves not only learning basic skills, but having the ability to apply those skills "on their feet."

A common misunderstanding of the Iowa Core Curriculum and current teaching methods is that they do not require students to master basic skills. To the contrary, our ability to move students to higher levels of thinking and the flexibility required to be successful in today's


What Is A Property Tax Rollback?

Report from Business Manager Ryan Eidahl & Superintendent Douglas Wheeler

Over two decades ago, residential property values were quickly rising. Fair market value was rising at a rate that was making some property owners unable to afford their taxes. In response, the Iowa Legislature passed an assessment limitation law called "rollback." The purpose was to help cushion the impact of inflation while keeping fair market values. The rollback is set by the Iowa Department of Revenue and is applied by property class.

It is called rollback because in is intended to roll back the taxable value of a house. For example, if you own a \$100,000 property and the rollback is set at 80%, you are only paying property taxes on \$80,000. The rollback is intended to ensure taxable property value does not go up more than 3% per year (this level was originally 4% and changed to 3% in 2013).

In a previous financial focus, I shared the following chart indicating where property tax revenue supporting the Saydel Schools is sourced:

As you can see in the above chart, these levels are adjusted based on needs and tax valuations. The rollback applies uniformly statewide.

An example of how this impacts a homeowner in Saydel can be illustrated with the following example. Our tax rate for this fiscal year is \$12.75 per \$1000 of assessed value. With residential rollback, this means a homeowner actually pays closer to \$7.09 per \$1,000 of their full assessed value.

The start of the school year is quickly approaching. I hope each family has had a relaxing and enjoyable summer. Having the honor of serving as principal for Woodside Middle School, I personally want to welcome each of you back to the 2016-17 school year. I look forward to learning more about the returning students and

families this year. I also welcome our incoming students and families to Woodside. We hope the transition to Woodside is a smooth and rewarding experience.

During the 2015-16 school year the Woodside building focus included the areas of climate and culture, involvement for all, and communication. Throughout the year I wrote about the initiatives taking place in our school to improve on these topics. As a building, we made gains in these areas and plan to continue to grow in these goal areas for years to come. With that being said, the 2016-17 school year brings our building new goals to focus our collective efforts.

Habits of Success/Positive Behavior:

Beginning in the 2016-17 school year students in the Saydel Community School District will be given feedback on their Habits for Success. The Habits for Success include the following categories:

- Personal Responsibility
- Works Well With Others
- Productively Works Toward Completing Goals

Teachers will teach, reteach, and enforce these habits in their classrooms and provide students and parents with feedback on how each child is doing in these areas. The Habits for Success support the district behavior matrix and Woodside's behavior foundation of Positive Behavior Intervention and Supports (PBIS). Woodside encourages all students to demonstrate the Eagle Way by being Safe, Open-minded, Accountable, and Respectful (SOAR) on a daily basis. Woodside staff will make it a priority to acknowledge students who demonstrate these behaviors this year using a new electronic system called PBIS Rewards. PBIS Rewards helps track students' Eagle Way points and allows for

ease of purchasing merchandise in the Eagle Way store. More information about PBIS Rewards will be shared with families during Back to School Night.

College and Career Awareness:

Preparing for life after high school is a long process. Rather than waiting until high school to begin discussing professional goals and aspirations, research encourages critical components begin to take place during the middle academic years. Woodside will begin imbedding college and career components into our instruction and activities we participate in throughout the year. Components such as developing career awareness, inquiring about professional aspirations, and reviewing post secondary options will become a priority for Woodside students. Engaging in these activities will kick start Woodside students' desire to dream and plan for life after high school.

Differentiation for all students:

The 2016-17 daily schedule at Woodside will be drastically different than years past. The new schedule improves student opportunity to be successful throughout the day and allows teachers to ensure student success. One change that will support each student academically is our "FLEX" time. FLEX is a 30-minute block of time which students will participate in based on their current academic need. Examples of a FLEX options include but are not limited to: Math enrichment, Reading, English Language Learners (ELL), and 5th/6th grade band. In order for Woodside to stay true to our vision statement, "Woodside is a place where all students connect, thrive, and achieve at high levels by engaging in learning opportunities that prepare students for success," developing multiple layers of support for all students will need to occur. Therefore, staff will spend time this year increasing our understanding of Multi-Tiered System of Support (MTSS).

As principal, my mission is to ensure each child is safe, challenged academically, and inspired to grow into the person they dream to be. The Woodside staff is equally committed and eager to support each child this school year. I invite each family to begin the school year on a positive note by attending Back To School Night on August 22. - Contemporary Affairs We have added this course in order to fill a gap in our social studies curriculum. Students will be engaging in learning about the significance and impact of events within contemporary history. As we wrap in financial literacy for this senior class, we will be eliminating our economics course.
- Scientific Research and Design This new independent study course will focus on students determining a problem to study, developing methods to test the problem and interpreting the test results.
- ProStart There are two courses within our ProStart program. These courses align with standards and learning outcomes of the National Restaurant Association. The goal of this chain of courses is intended to prepare students with managing and culinary skills.
- **Skilled Trades 1** We are in the first year of redefining our industrial technology program. This course is the first step in working toward an internship. Students will complete the course being able to read housing plans and construct the frame of a house.
- **Skilled Trades 2** This is the second course in our electrical careers pathway. Students will learn and demonstrate plumbing, electrical and finishing skills.

Saydel Food Service Update

The Saydel Food Service Department provides a quality meal program to all students and staff. Each school kitchen has is managed by a kitchen manager and head cook who prepare the daily menu items.

To adhere to the National School Lunch Program, Saydel Community School District is required to increase school lunch prices at all buildings in order to be in compliance with federal regulations. Milk prices will increase to \$0.45 per pint. This increase also includes adult lunch prices. Costs for breakfast will remain the same. Food Allergies

A Diet Modification Request for Foods Served form needs to be signed by a physician licensed by the State and returned to the nurse where your student attends. An English and Spanish version of the form can be found on www.saydel.k12.ia.us.

Cornell Elementary will be participating for the second year in the Community Eligibility Provision (CEP) for School Year 16-17. All students at Cornell are eligible to receive free breakfast and lunch at school at each day for the school year. There will be a charge for an extra milk or to have a second entrée.


What Is a Reimbursable Meal?

A reimbursable meal is a federal formula in which helps each district determine whether they receive a monetary reimbursement from the Federal Government for each meal given to students. Students are required to take three of those five components in order for us to count it as a "reimbursable meal". Students are also required to take a serving of a fruit *or* vegetable for it to count as a reimbursable meal. The components offered are:

- Milk (must be skim or 1% for flavored milk)
- Meat/meat alternate
 (meat, cheese, cottage cheese, yogurt, beans/legumes
- Whole grain rich bread/grains
- Fruit /vegetables

At breakfast, we are required to offer four components:

- 1-2 ounce equivalent servings of bread/grain
- ½ cup serving of fruit
- ½ cup serving of 100% juice
- Milk

Free and Reduced Meal Application: The Iowa Eligibility Application for the 16-17 school year is now available. This is an annual process and is strictly confidential. Please complete the application and return as soon as possible. Once the application is received and processed, you will receive a mailed letter stating the eligibility for your children for the 16-17 school year. Students who qualify for reduced-price meals must



have money in their accounts to cover their reduced-price breakfast and/or lunch and if they wish to purchase extra entrées, milk or a la carte items. Frequently Asked Questions About Free & Reduced Meals

Children need healthy meals to learn. Saydel Community School District offers healthy meals every school day. Breakfast costs \$1.60-\$1.80; lunch costs \$2.55-\$2.90 for secondary (High School and Jr. High School). Your child(ren) may qualify for free meals or for reduced-price meals. Reduced price is \$0.30 for breakfast and \$0.40 for lunch. Following are some common questions and answers to help you with the application process

1. Who can get free or reduced price meals?

- All children in households receiving benefits from SNAP, FDPIR, or TANF, are eligible for free meals.
- Foster children that are under the legal responsibility of a foster care agency or court are eligible for free meals.
- Children participating in their school's Head Start program are eligible for free meals.
- Children who meet the definition of homeless, runaway, or migrant are eligible for free meals. Children may receive free or reduced price meals if your household's income is within the limits on the Federal Income Eligibility Guidelines. Your children may qualify for free or reduced price meals if your household income falls at or below the limits on this chart.
- 2. How do I know if my children qualify as homeless, migrant, or runaway? Do the members of your household lack a permanent address? Are you staying together in a shelter, hotel, or other temporary housing arrangement? Does your family relocate on a seasonal basis? Are any children living with you who have chosen to leave their prior family or household? If you believe children in your household meet these descriptions and haven't been told your children will get free meals, please call or e-mail Julie McKibben at mckibbenjulie@saydel.net.

- 3. Do I need to fill out an application for each child? No. Use one Free and Reduced Price School Meals Application for all students in your household. We cannot approve an application that is not complete, so be sure to fill out all required information. Return the completed application to: Jessy Sadler, 5740 NE 14th Street, Des Moines, IA 50313, 1-515-264-0866.
 4. Should I fill out an application if I received a letter this school year saying my children are already approved for free meals? No, but please read the letter you got carefully and follow the instructions. If any children in your household were missing from your eligibility notification, contact Jessy Sadler, 5740 NE 14th Street, Des Moines, IA 50313, 1-515-264-0866 immediately.
- **5. Can I apply online?** Yes! You are encouraged to complete an online application instead of a paper application if you are able. The online application has the same requirements and will ask you for the same information as the paper application. Visit **www.saydel.k12.ia.us** to begin or to learn more about the online application process.

- **6.** My child's application was approved last year. Do I need to fill out a new one? Yes. Your child's application is only good for that school year and for the first few days of this school year. You must send in a new application unless the school told you that your child is eligible for the new school year. If you do not send in a new application that is approved by the school or you have not been notified that your child is eligible for free meals, your child will be charged the full price for meals.
- **7. I get WIC. Can my children get free meals?** Children in households participating in WIC may be eligible for free or reduced price meals. Please send in an application.
- **8. Will the information I give be checked?** Yes. We may also ask you to send written proof of the household income you report.
- **9.** If I don't qualify now, may I apply later? Yes, you may apply at any time during the school year. For example, children with a parent or guardian who becomes unemployed may become eligible for free and reduced price meals if the household income drops below the income limit.
- 10. What if I disagree with the school's decision about my application? You should talk to school officials. You also may ask for a hearing by calling or writing to: Ryan Eidahl, Business Manager, 5740 NE 14th Street, Des Moines, IA 50313, 1-515-264-0866.
- **11.** May I apply if someone in my household is not a U.S. citizen? Yes. You, your children, or other household members do not have to be U.S. citizens to apply for free or reduced price meals.
- **12.** What if my income is not always the same? List the amount that you normally receive. For example, if you normally make \$1000 each month, but you missed some work last month and only made \$900, put down that you made \$1000 per month. If you normally get overtime, include it, but do not include it if you only work overtime sometimes. If you have lost a job or had your hours or wages reduced, use your current income.
- 13. What if some household members have no income to report? Household members may not receive some types of income we ask you to report on the application, or may not receive income at all. Whenever this happens, please write a 0 in the field. However, if any income fields are left empty or blank, those will also be counted as zeroes. Please be careful when leaving income fields blank, as we will assume you meant to do so.
- 14. We are in the military. Do we report our income differently? Your basic pay and cash bonuses must be reported as income. If you get any cash value allowances for off-base housing, food, or clothing, it must also be included as income. However, if your housing is part of the Military Housing Privatization Initiative, do not include your housing allowance as income. Any additional combat pay resulting from deployment is also excluded from income.

- 15. What if there isn't enough space on the application for my family? List any additional household members on a separate piece of paper, and attach it to your application. Contact Jessy Sadler, 5740 NE 14th Street, Des Moines, IA 50313, 1-515-264-0866 to receive a second application.
- **16.** My family needs more help. Are there other programs we might apply for? To find out how to apply for SNAP or other assistance benefits, contact your local assistance office or call 1-877-347-5678.

Saydel School District Buildings & Grounds Update



Message from Supervisor of Buildings & Grounds Dan Willson

I wanted to share an update on progress being made this summer on one of our projects at Saydel High School.

Let me start by giving you a little history on this project. About a year and a half ago we toured a number of other school buildings in Des Moines, Ankeny and

Ballard/Huxley as a part of our research in Saydel's 10-year building improvement plan.

One of the features we saw in many of these school buildings was that the concrete floor had been polished instead of using a floor covering. We all liked how this looked in the buildings. Last year, we pulled the VCT (vinyl tile) up from the science wing hall at Saydel High School to do a test area. Again, we where pleased with the results, so we put a plan in place to do other hallways in

the building during the next few years.

This year we are doing the hallway outside of the media center and the main hallway that goes past the 200 rooms east through the band area at the high school.

This phase is a big step in transitioning our hallways so they have a polished concrete finish. This process gives a brilliant sheen to the surface of the concrete and it requires very little maintenance, which is another reason we are doing it.

On average, it would cost \$1.50 a sq.ft. to yearly maintain a VCT floor. Our cost savings will come back to us after three years.

The new addition at Cornell Elementary will have this same floor work done.

When we finish this project at the high school, our plan is to continue this floor polishing at our other buildings with Woodside Middle School being the higher priority.

START OF SCHOOL HEALTH REMINDERS

State law requires all incoming 7th grade students to have updated immunization records on file at the school prior to school beginning. If your child is entering 7th grade, make sure they have Tdap booster before school begins. Updated immunization records can be brought to the district during registration or Back To School Night.

All incoming 9th grade students should have an updated dental screening on file at the school prior to school beginning. If your child is entering 9th grade, make sure they have a dental screening by a hygienist or dentist before school begins. Updated records can be brought to the district during registration.

If your child is planning on participating in extracurricular athletics during the 2016-17 school year, please ensure a physical is on file in the athletic director office. Physical forms can be found at the district website under the District and Forms tab. You can also find district forms at http://www.saydel.k12.ia.us/district/ Forms.cfm.

What is this Concussion Form?

We get many questions about why each year our students are reading and signing a form about concussions. The State of Iowa requires this of all students participating in activities with the risk of concussions. The Heads Up program includes mandatory trainings for coaches and medical staff to better prevent, identify, and treat students with concussion symptoms. This is an issue that affects students in youth sports and leagues as well as students on the varsity roster. If you would like more information go to http://www.cdc.gov/headsup/youthsports/.

Why Do We Charge for Middle School Events?

We are often asked this question. The reason we charge for these events is because it helps to offset our expenditures so we can offer middle school programs. Each middle scho ol football game costs a minimum of \$180 in officials' fees, for volleyball and softball - \$110, for basketball and baseball - \$120, wrestling - \$60, and track - \$95. Additionally, we need to provide equipment or pay participation fees for competition. We greatly appreciate your attendance and support of our 7th and 8th graders. These programs are great feeders into our high school activities and provide extra benefits to your child's educational experience.

Saydel Student Services & Special Education Update



Message from Director Julie McKibben

I am very excited to begin my third year in the district. As I grow in this position, I find myself expanding my focus from special education to all the various areas of student services.

The 2015-16 school year allowed for specific work in the area of social/emotional health of our staff and student body. Through the work of the guidance counselors, school nurses, district social worker, and

our community connection, Employee and Family Resources (EFR), the district rolled out an anti-bullying and harassment campaign at the homecoming parade, providing bracelets those along the parade route. They also had a student-supported booth at the homecoming game that provided information. Each month buildings were provided resources from EFR that allowed for a continual focus on social/emotional health.

Along with anti-bullying and harassment campaign, additional resources were provided for substance abuse awareness and mental health awareness. The focus for social/emotional health this year will continue the work of supporting student needs in the area of bullying/harassment, substance abuse awareness, and the support of social/emotional needs. We have added a full-time behavioral health intervention service counselor at Cornell and a part-time EFR counselor that will share time at Woodside and Saydel High School.

Our English Language Learners (ELL) program added a half-time teacher to support all three buildings this past year. The teachers also had strong professional development. They participated in the Iowa Culture and Language Conference and the Teachers of English to Speakers of Other Languages (TESOL) Convention. We were very fortunate to bring building administrators, district administrators, and classroom teachers to the TESOL convention as well. This year we will be introducing a Sheltered Instruction Operational Protocol (SIOP) model to the ELL program. This will allow for intense intervention for limited English learners as well as guided support within the general education classroom. There will be SIOP teacher leaders at Cornell Elementary and Woodside Middle School this year.

The ELP program continued their work of teacher supports for co-teaching and inclusion as well as small group instruction for the enhancement of reading and math instruction this past year. The district took a close look at the identification of ELP/TAG students and will be focusing on re-alignment to meet state and federal guidelines.

The At-Risk department will continue their work on building a strong Multi-Tiered System of Support (MTSS) for each building. This work will allow for a tiered approach to identifying and supporting diverse learners within the general education setting as well as within small group instruction. The focus will include both academic and behavioral supports.

Special Education underwent some changes this school year. The first change included the implementation the Dashboard monitoring system for student support. Teachers received training and supports from AEA consultants to enter and analyze student data to make data-driven decisions to meet student needs. Co-teaching will continue this school year along with training and support from our district co-teaching facilitator, Jen St. Peter. Jen will provide strategies for teachers to support students in the inclusion model.

After reviewing co-teaching data, each building will be making some needed changes to support the needs of our diverse learners. Cornell Elementary will be implementing a hybrid version of co-teaching that will allow more time in small group setting for intense supports. Woodside Middle School will have additional skills time in a small group setting and Saydel High School will focus on reading and math for their co-teaching model.

Another area of focus for special education included implementing more specialized programs for behavior and intellectual disabilities. These programs will continue for the upcoming school year and we will add a program at Woodside Middle School in the area of intellectual disabilities. The high school will continue the workability program for special education students. This program will be a continued priority.

The Practical Assessment Exploration System (PAES) lab provides students with:

- Work and Life Skill Training
- Vocational Work Assessment
- Work Exploration
- Appropriate Work Behavior Development
- Data Collection and Student Reporting
- An Accurate Description of Student Performance and Employment Potential

In addition to the PAES program, the school store, The Shack, will reopen this school year and provide real-life application for students.

The Cornell Preschool Program is a safe and caring environment where your child will be able to learn through play and become creative, confident thinkers. Here are a few reminders for the beginning of the school year. The first day of preschool will be Tuesday, August 30. Our 3-year-old preschool runs from 8:45-11:15 am. We have two 4-year-old preschool programs. One runs from 8:45-11:45 am and the other runs from12:15-3:15 pm. Both preschool programs are held Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday. Prior to your child starting preschool there are a few requirements.

If your child is enrolled in our 3-year-old program, you will need to attend a parent meeting on August 23 at 10 am in the Cornell cafeteria. Please bring your child along with you to see the classroom.

If your child is enrolled in our 4-year-old program a home visit is required before your child can begin preschool. Home visits are 20 minutes long and are held August 24-26 and August 29 during school hours.

These home visits are a time for your child to meet their teacher and for you to be given information about the preschool program. You will need to sign up for your home visit time slot during Back To School Night which is August 22 from 4:30 pm-6 pm at Cornell. You and your child can also explore our preschool classrooms during this time.

Research tells us that children who attend a high-quality preschool enter kindergarten with better pre-reading skills, richer vocabularies, and stronger basic math skills than those who do not.

Saydel Curriculum, Instruction & Assessment Update



Message from Director Mary Salazar

As I start my sixth year in the district I am very excited to begin my work as the Director of Curriculum, Instruction and Assessment.

Before the 2016-17 school year begins, teachers will have the opportunity to start the process of unpacking their Iowa Core teaching standards. This work will continue during the first semester of the

school year. After the standards unpacking process is complete, teachers will work to develop 4-point scales of proficiency for their standards which aligns with our Grading for Growth initiative.

Creation of these proficiency scales will eventually lead to the design of additional assessments aligned to Iowa Core standards. Going through this unpacking process will allow teachers to understand their standards in a deeper way, allowing us to continue to provide highly engaging and challenging learning opportunities for all students.

During the 2015-16 school year, teachers began working with new curriculum materials in many content areas. These new materials allowed teachers to create meaningful units of study that emphasized higher order thinking and student-centered learning experiences. The work continues this year with these new materials as all teachers work to ensure students are challenged each and every day.

Another exciting addition for this upcoming school year is the creation of an outdoor classroom for the preschool program at Cornell.

Director of Special Education and Student Services Julie McKibben has been working with the preschool teachers to ensure that we are giving our youngest students learning experiences that allow them to create, explore and learn. In addition to the outdoor classroom, we are committed to increasing Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) learning opportunities in each of our preschool classrooms. Giving our preschool students more STEM opportunities aligns with our increase in STEM opportunities district wide in the previous years.

As we move into the fifth year of our TAP grant, we will continue our work around ensuring that our delivery of instruction, along with the instructional strategies used, increase student achievement. Each building TAP Leadership Team (TLT) has analyzed 2015-16 student assessment data to create specific goals for student achievement; these building goals are set in the areas of reading and math. Master and mentor teachers, with the leadership of the building principals will design multi-week professional development sessions targeting identified areas of student need.

Our district master teacher team has begun the work of developing a district wide study of the TAP Instructional Rubric for the fall of this school year; as a district we will be focusing on Thinking, Problem Solving and Assessment. The goal of this rubric study is to better understand how Thinking, Problem Solving and Assessment experiences can be designed and incorporated into our existing units of study.

I look forward to the upcoming school year as we continue to work hard each day to make sure the students of the Saydel Community School District continue to learn and grow.

This information is not intended to advocate for or against PERL. The intention of this communication is to inform you of the facts related to the election.

What is PERL?

Revenues from the Public Education & Recreation Levy (PERL) are used to establish and maintain public recreation places and playgrounds in the public school buildings and grounds of the district. The PERL revenues are also used to provide public educational and recreational activities within the district boundaries and for community education as defined in lowa Code. The levy provides \$0.135 per \$1,000 to support public education and recreation opportunities in the Saydel School District. If approved, the tax would take effect for the 2016-2017 school year. The goal of this levy is to elevate an already strong sense of community in Saydel through expanding opportunities for community recreation and engagement for all ages.

Why has the public requested a vote for PERL?

Saydel resides in an unincorporated area of Polk County. While we have strong established communities, our communities do not have the same level of community engagement and recreation opportunities experienced by citizens of incorporated areas. There is no public entity to support public recreation for youth or adult educational opportunities for the general public. While Saydel has a strong and successful history of youth athletic programs, the scope of these programs is limited by available volunteer coordination and funding. In addition, there are no opportunities for the general public to fully utilize school facilities for recreation and learning beyond school hours.

If approved, PERL will generate approximately \$95,000 per year (based on yearly valuation) to support:

- Creation, organization and staffing of a community education program.
- Funding to support facility and resource enhancements to areas utilized by the general public for non-school related activities.

The intention of creating a Community Education Program is to:

- Increase access and availability of athletic, fine arts and club programs for K-6 students outside of the school day and year.
- Increase availability for facility use and community learning opportunities for the general public, including creating adult education courses and community engagement opportunities.
- Complement and enhance opportunities for 7-12 students to engage with the greater community.

Why not just start community education programs without assessing the tax?

PERL will give us the funding to create a self-sustaining community education program. Currently, these programs are coordinated by volunteers and exist outside of the Saydel Community School District. Because of this status, the Saydel Schools cannot fully assist in the promotion, organization or operation of these programs. Having support to coordinate volunteers, arrange events and assist in promotion and communication will be essential in increasing opportunities. Community education offerings will have a fee structure due to operational costs, but PERL will help ensure this fee structure makes programs accessible to the public. This money can also be used to upgrade property owned by the school district, but primarily dedicated to public use. Examples include the Woodside baseball fields, Cornell field, and other public use spaces.
