New Course Offerings

Principles of Marketing and Principles of Finance

These courses have been added as the next step for our High School of Business Implementation. These are the intermediate phase of our High School of Business implementation.

AP Language and Composition

This is an added advanced option for students. The intent with adding this course is to provide students with the opportunity to take an AP English class both junior and senior year.

Contemporary Affairs

Our social studies department identified a gap in our history curriculum (recent history), which this course is intended to cover. As a result, this will replace Economics as a social studies requirement for 12th graders. The department also identified the need not to lose the financial literacy component embedded in Economics. This course has been designed to fit in the financial literacy components within the appropriate unit of Contemporary Affairs.

Scientific Research and Design

This independent study course is designed to develop student thinking and help extend student learning based student interests. Students would be working to identify an issue, design an experiment and present their findings.

Pro Start 1 and Pro Start 2

Research into these courses began in 2014. These courses align with National Restaurant Association curriculum to help prepare students for careers within the restaurant management industry. These courses not only focus on food handling and preparation, but also on restaurant development and management.



Grading For Growth

The teachers below have been chosen to participate in a pilot study for Grading for Growth, which is often called standards-based or standards-referenced grading in other districts. This group of innovators was already implementing grading reform during first semester and has agreed to continue implementing under district guidance. Grading Policy Improvements

his semester we have made adjustments how we determine a student's semester grade.

Past Practice:

Our semester grades have been determined by calculating 40% of your student's 1st quarter grade, 40% of your student's 2nd quarter grade and 20% from the final. This practice has always created some confusion about what a student's semester grade is and also distracts from the fact that our learning builds on things from early in the semester.

The beginning of new quarter does not create a fresh slate even though our past practice may have reflected that. Also, having 1/5 of your student's grade determined from a single assignment placed an uneven weight for student grades on that one test/project.

New Practice Beginning 2nd Semester:

This adjustment will provide students and parents a clearer picture of the grade that will appear at the end of the semester.

Grades will be determined through two components:

- 90% of the grade will be from scores from the entire semester and
- 10% of the grade will be from the semester final.

This means that parents will no longer see two separate quarter grades in PowerSchool. Instead, parents will only see a single semester grade. We will continue with progress reports every 4.5 weeks.

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Need Help Paying for College?

The Saydel guidance department would like to let parents and students know that there will be several opportunities for students and families to receive assistance in filling out the 2016-2017 Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). The FAFSA is the required form to apply for federal and state financial aid programs. The form can also be required for aid offered by colleges and universities as well as private scholarship programs. The earlier you are able to fill out the FAFSA improves your opportunity to receive federal aid and scholarships. You will also need to check with the colleges and/or universities that your student wants to attend to be aware of their FAFSA deadline.

Across the Des Moines Metro area there will be several locations in which families may go to receive help in filling out the online form. There is no cost to attend one of these events. To save time for the event, it is suggested that families pre-register. On January 27, Mr. Schulte, Mr. Busch, Mr. Stubbers and Ms. Larson met with each grade level in small group settings to discuss the registration process, new courses offered next fall and to discuss the importance of planning for the future.

We encourage parents to have conversations with students about taking classes that not only will prepare them for post-secondary endeavors but a wide variety of classes to explore their different interests. The high school students will register for courses during their academic support time on February 4 and 5. Throughout the month of February, students will be able to adjust their course selections.

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What Is a Reimbursable Meal?

A reimbursable meal is a federal formula which helps each district determine whether they receive a monetary reimbursement from the Federal Government for each meal given to students. This does not include adult meals or a second full meal for a student. In order to get that reimbursement, the USDA guidelines and the "Offer versus Serve" program must be followed. The lunch and breakfast programs are a little different, so let's just start with lunch:

Lunch:

At lunch, we are required to "offer" students five components with each meal. Students are required to

take three of those five components in order for us to count it as a "reimbursable meal". Students are also required to take a serving of a fruit *or* vegetable for us to count it as a reimbursable meal. The components offered are:

- Milk (must be skim or 1% for flavored milk)
- Meat/meat alternate (meat, cheese, cottage cheese, yogurt, beans/legumes
- Bread/grains

 (All Grains served must be "whole grain rich" including breading, cookies, cereal, pretzels, etc.)
- Fruit /vegetables
 (There is a requirement for certain subcategories of vegetables according to their color and nutritional content.)



There are different requirements for different age groups for certain components. For example, at the High School level, we need to offer 10-12 bread/grain servings each week. At the Middle School we need to offer 8- 10 bread/grain servings each week. At the Elementary level, we are required to offer 8-9 servings of bread/grain items each week.

What Is a Reimbursable Meal? Cont.

Example 1 of a Reimbursable Lunch: The main item is WG spaghetti and with meat sauce. We put the pasta and meat sauce on the student's tray. Because it contains a bread/grain component and the meat component, the student then only needs to take a serving of a fruit or vegetable to meet the minimum requirement for a reimbursable meal. They also can take a carton of milk or other item offered as part of the regular lunch, such as one breadstick, and not be charged.

Example 2 of a Reimbursable Lunch: The main item is chili. The chili counts as the meat/meat alternate item. Students would have to take 2 more components for us to count that as a reimbursable meal. They could choose from an 8 oz. carton of milk, a serving of fruit, a serving of vegetables, or a serving of a bread/grain item. Again,

one of the three components on their tray has to be a serving of a fruit or vegetable.

Breakfast:

At breakfast, we are required to offer four components:

- 1-2 ounce equivalent servings of bread/grain
- ½ cup serving of fruit
- ½ cup serving of 100% juice
- Milk

Students are required to take a serving of a fruit to be counted as a reimbursable meal.



Offer vs. serve at breakfast requires students to take 3 of the 4 components. At minimum, we can count a breakfast as reimbursable if a student takes either milk or one 4 oz. juice serving with a combination of the bread/grain and meat components. Without being charged for an extra item, students can take a carton of milk, 4 oz. juice/fruit and a combination of the bread/grain and meat components.

Example 1 of a Reimbursable Breakfast:

Whole Grain Pancakes, ½ cup fruit, and a carton of milk

Example 2 of a Reimbursable Breakfast:

Cereal (1oz container), 1 piece of toast or 1 package of graham crackers, 1 carton of milk, and ½ cup of fruit.

All of our kitchen staff are trained to ensure that each tray holds a reimbursable meal!

Name: David Musser

Position at Saydel High School: Special Ed Teacher

Describe your career and educational background.

"In college I studied Art and Theater, earning a BA degree in Theater, and a Bachelor of Fine Arts in Painting from the University of South Dakota. While there I also studied Art Education and acquired my Teaching certification. During college, I worked summer internships at the Des Moines Metro Opera, working backstage for two seasons. After graduation I worked for several years as an Exhibits Production Coordinator, designing and installing museum exhibits for the

Arizona Historical Society and the Discovery Museum in Sacramento, CA. I also worked cataloging and installing works of Art at the Des Moines Art Center. As a Teacher I have worked for Des Moines Public Schools, and at the Iowa State Training School."

Why have you chosen to be a part of one of society's most rewarding and challenging professions?

"I initially sought training in Education as a plan B. Art and Theater are both difficult fields to find work in, so teaching was my fall back option. Years later, while working as a Substitute Teacher, I had the opportunity to work with a group of Special Education students at an alternative school for students with behavior concerns. I found that I really enjoyed working with that population of students, and felt that I could make a difference. That's when I fell in love with teaching and pursued training in Special Education from Drake University. I have now been working as a Teacher or Substitute Teacher for the past 16 years."
