#### Principal's Message

always find it interesting to sit back and listen to a group of individuals whom share the same occupation "talk shop." It seems to me that it does not matter how long the individuals have known each other or if they work for the same organization, people can talk about their work to folks that share the same vocation.

In these situations, I wish I could interject into the conversation, but I often find myself confused of the odd lingo shared by the group of professionals. My wife has expressed the same feeling whenever a group of my peers gather. Topics of conversation for educators over the years include MAP, SRG, AYP, NCLB, SIAC, and MTSS to name a few. If you are confused by the educator alphabet we commonly reference, I apologize. For that reason, I would like to discuss

Multi-Tiered System of Supports (MTSS) in this month's Woodside newsletter.



Figure 1: or is struggling with the subject and what to do to support the student.

MTSS is a term to describe a model of schooling that supports all students' academic and behavioral instructional needs. MTSS operates under the premise that every student will succeed in education. This type of thinking is a philosophical shift from older practices. Old practices had teachers plan for instruction, instruct, assign a task, grade the task, and move on to the next learning target. MTSS requires educators to think about students that may not grasp a concept the first time it is taught or is struggling with the subject and determine what to do to support the student.

MTSS can best be described as multiple layers of support to ensure every student is successful. Figure 2: MTSS Layers of Support is a model of how one can view the learning process and supports available to every student under MTSS. The first layer in the MTSS model is labeled differentiated core. This layer of instruction is delivered by the general education teacher to 100% of students. If a student is not successful in a certain content area, the school may elect to add an additional layer of support for the student.

In this situation, the student would receive differentiated core and supplemental support in hopes the student would be able to make academic gains. MTSS models suggest 20% of students may fall in this layer of support. The final layer of support, intensive support, would be added to a student that does not show academic gains after receiving the first two layers. MTSS practices indicate less than 5% of the student population could receive all three layers of MTSS support.

# ELL Program at Saydel Community School District

As a new and first full time ELL teacher at Saydel Community School District, I am thrilled to take the responsibility of this great job and service our ELL students in all three buildings; Cornell Elementary School, Woodside Middle School and Saydel High School. I am very proud that our program is thriving.

When I started this job, I truly thought that with my passion for teaching English as a second language, I could instill it into every student that I was going to teach. Currently we have 80 ELL students in our district.

Collectively, our ELL students speak over four different languages, Spanish, Karen, Tagolog and Romanian which add a linguistically diverse and multi-cultural richness to our growing district wide student population. We have both Pull-Out and Push-In program models.

The goal of the ELL program is to familiarize ELL students with the varied cultures and customs of the United States while promoting their own ethnic pride through cultural diversity and sensitivity, academic mastery of subject matter content and higher order skills including critical thinking, so as to meet appropriate grade promotion and graduation requirements.

The major goal of the first year of ELL instruction is rapid language acquisition with emphasis on listening, speaking, reading and writing in English. The goal of second and third year ELL instruction is to develop that content area language that they need to be successful in schools. Research states that it can take a student six years to become totally fluent in a second language and up to eight years to develop the cognitive academic language proficiency.

Helping individual ELLs master academic language is a complex, long-term process, not an event or a program with a clear end date.

The absolute joy I feel when I connect with each student is hard to describe. I am helping these students learn to navigate their world; teaching them how to be enthusiastic learners. Their progress has been amazing, and I am in awe at how far they have come in such a short amount of time. I have no doubt that they will be able to speak English fluently one day.

We continue to explore our new math curriculum and are happy to be starting our second module! Module 2's focus is multi-digit multiplication and division (including decimals). We will be learning mental strategies, algorithms, and order of operations.

Science classes have just finished investigating the day/night cycle and why the sun appears to move across the sky. For their assessment, students are creating a children's book explaining and illustrating these concepts.



uring technology classes this year all 5th and 6th graders will be experiencing coding. We start with Code Monkey (www.playcodemonkey.com). The games develop basic coding language by teaching students how to move the monkey to retrieve the banana. The kids enjoy the challenge. Once they have mastered Code Monkey they progress to other programs (Code: code.org, Codecademy: www.codeacademy.com) Exposing students to the structure of technical language increases their understanding.

They just finished using Excel to answer questions about "The Twelve Days of Christmas." The 5th graders calculated if you purchased what the song calls for you would buy 364 items. The 6th graders calculated the approximate cost of these items \$266,000.00+.

Saydel has implemented a new program: Easy Tech. It provides keyboarding instruction and basic technology development: hardware and software fundamentals, online safety, and basic office applications. This year we have introduced the program to 3rd and 4th graders. With the district's move to 1:1 in grades 4-12, the development of adequate keyboarding skills is a necessity.

The students daily develop their skills to locate answers on the web to posted questions. We start out doing the work in large group, then progress to partners. Occasionally I ask the students to work on their own to be able to judge their skill. I have changed their browser to duckduckgo. It is a very powerful program. Many browsers track what you search and will alter the results you get back.

You can get a bias view from Goggle, Bing, Yahoo. "Duck" does not track your searching and therefore does not pick articles/information to match your search history. Today's question was who wrote "Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer" and why was it written? Did you know Robert May wrote the book in 1939 as a promotional item for the Montgomery Ward stores? Technology will continue to impact all areas of our lives. The school will expose our students to technology hoping to make them "technology literate" for their futures in the 21st century.



### Hour of Code at Woodside Middle School

\ \ e live in a world surrounded by technology. And we know that whatever field our students choose to go into as adults, their ability to succeed will increasingly hinge on understanding how technology works. That's why the seventh grade joined the largest learning event in history: The Hour of Code. More than 100 million students worldwide have already tried an Hour of Code.

This introduction to computer programming gave our students the chance to experience how computers work. During their workshop, students were able to apply their problem solving skills by using code to draw a snowman. The sky was the limit for creativity as students began to personalize their snowman by adding arms, buttons, a hat, or color. Although it was only an hour, many students expressed interest in continuing to learn more about coding. #### **Brown Sugar Blondies**

adapted from Allrecipes.com

#### **Ingredients:**

- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/8 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/3 cup butter
- 1 cup packed brown sugar
- 1 egg
- 1 tablespoon vanilla extract
- 1 cup to 1 1/3 cup M&M's

#### **Directions:**

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F.
- 2. Mix together flour, baking powder, baking soda, and salt and set aside.
- 3. Melt 1/3 cup butter. Add 1 cup firmly packed brown sugar and mix well. Cool slightly.
- 4. Add egg (beaten) and vanilla and blend well.
- 5. Add flour mixture, a little at a time, mixing well. Mix in 2/3 cup M&M's. Spread in 9 x 9 x 2 inch pan. Sprinkle 1/3 to 2/3 cup M&M's on top. Bake for 20 to 25 minutes.
- 6. Store in airtight container at room temperature.

# **6th Graders Conduct Scientific Investigations**

In sixth grade science, students have been investigating the impact of the sun's thermal energy on both Earth's surface and the atmosphere. Groups of students were challenged to measure and record which item, sand or water, heated up and cooled off most quickly. They were exploring each object's thermal capacity. Many groups reached the same conclusion and were able to explain the why and how of what they witnessed through their scientific investigation.

The focus math has taken has been on using number lines to compare integers and rational numbers. Utilizing such a simple tool has helped many students gain a deeper understanding of what a number truly is and represents. Students have most recently been challenged by graphing order pairs on coordinate planes in order to show numeric relationships.






# 7th Graders Study "Americans All"



The 7th grade language literacy students started a new unit after winter break called Americans All. This unit is about the racial injustice many ethnic groups experienced in the United States during WWII and how they handled facing the injustice. Students will read about and examine topics such as the Japanese Americans who were sent to

internment camps, Native Americans who helped decode messages written in Navajo during the war, and African Americans whose courage helped to create a more integrated military.

Along with reading many different nonfiction articles about the different ethnic groups and their experiences, students will read the novel called Code Talker by Joseph Bruchac, which is about a young Navajo boy who enlists in the Marine Corps to decode crucial messages to aid in the conflict against Japan. They will also read the book called *Courage Has No Color: The True Story of the Triple Nickles* by Tanya Lee Stone, which is about America's first black paratroopers.
