## Principal's Message

Asking the Right Questions to Learn More About School

It is hard to admit this, but my kids do not like to Italk to me about school. Almost every night I ask my my third and fifth grader the standardized question, "How was school today? or "What did you learn today?" With no surprise to many of you, the common response I received was "BORING! and "NOTHING!"

I have been in my children's classrooms and they are not boring. I have been in the education profession for 16 years and I am confident more than NOTHING is being taught. So why the common responses from


Principal Joshua Heyer my children? According to Sara Goldstein, author of 30 Questions To Ask Your Kid Instead of "How Was Your Day?, I need to be asking the different questions.

The author suggested the standardized questions I had been asking my children were boring, too open-ended and did not allow for a conversation starter with kids. After reading the article and surfing the web for other articles that compared, I attacked the supper table with a different set of questions. I was a bit nervous, but I figured anything would be better than the single word response I had been getting for awhile now.

So without delay, I asked my son, "Which of your teachers was a better athlete when they were in school?"It worked! My son was able to talk about each of his teachers like he had not before. I was able to ask my son follow up questions that allowed me to get a glimpse into what had occurred that day.

I attempted the same hypnotic approach with my daughter by asking her "What was your peak and what was your valley for the day and when did these occur?" She was able to open up and talk about her struggle at recess and her love for art. Over the month, I have attempted to ask my children some different questions in hopes they will talk to me about school. Some work. Some, not so much.

Below are some of the questions $\mid$ found to be fruitful in our house. If you get the same BORING and NOTHING responses I receive from my children, give some of these questions a try.

- What was the funniest thing that happened today? Did you catch anyone picking their nose/ something funny?
- Which one of your teachers would survive a zombie apocalypse? Why?
- What challenged you today? Why?
- Tell me something you learned about a friend today.
- Does anyone in your class have a hard time following the rules?
- Which area of your school is the most fun?
- If I called your teacher tonight, what would she tell me about you?

# Cultures in Conflict: 5th Grade Literacy Update

Fifth grade students are nearing the end of their first Wheatley module, Cultures in Conflict, in their literacy classes. Students studied culture, cultural values, and the Nez Perce Native American tribe in preparation for a study of Nez Perce leader Chief Joseph. Students read the anchor text Thunder Rolling in the Mountains by Scott O'Dell and Elizabeth Hall and inferred values and beliefs that guide Chief Joseph throughout the novel. Students then gathered relevant text evidence for each value.

Finally, students wrote four paragraph informative essays to answer the focusing question, "What important beliefs and values guide Chief Joseph in his life?" Throughout the module, students have gained tremendous insight into the conflict between the United States army and the Nez Perce tribe in the late 1800's, including how each side's actions reflected their values.

We hope that you will ask your student about their essays and what they are learning in literacy. They have worked hard on this module, and we look forward to beginning a new module after Spring Break!

# Growing Teachers \& Students

Teachers at Woodside get the opportunity to engage in new learning each week through Cluster. During this time they focus in best practices in teaching while improving building-wide needs for students. During the most recent learning cycle, teachers have been focusing on one of two areas depending on what they teach.
Math, science and some special education teachers have been learning about how to support students' number sense, which is a "fluidity and flexibility with numbers," (Gersten \& Chard, 2001). That means that students understand what numbers mean, how they relate to one another, how to use numbers in real world situations, and how to do mental math.
In order to support students' understanding of number sense, teachers have been focusing on concrete activities where students are in some way physically involved or hands-on in their learning. They've incorporated additional representational activities, where there is a picture or visual to help students understand the learning, and finally they've been helping students develop abstract thinking where the students have to construct knowledge in their head. Using these different levels of support and thinking along with questions that allows students to talk through their reasoning allows students to have more fluid and flexible thinking.
The other teachers in the building have been working on improving vocabulary skills and comprehension. There is a well-documented link between having a strong vocabulary and reading comprehension. It's hard to understand the meaning of a passage or article if you're not sure what some of the key words mean.

There were three types of vocabulary on which teachers focused. One was knowing content-specific words that don't have a lot of clues to help you determine what the word means. Another type was having morphemic awareness, which means using the parts of the word (prefix, root, suffix) to help figure out what the word means. Ask your student if they can share with you a prefix or root they have learned about at school. The final vocabulary type that teacher have concentrated on is words that have more than one meaning.
Teachers have also spent time in cluster working to analyze student work. This allows teachers to have a clearer understanding of what specific skills students need to work on and allows them to make modifications to meet each student's needs.

# VOTER INFORMATION Saydel Community School District Please Vote in the April 5 Special Election on the Public Education \& Recreation Levy (PERL) 

This information is not intended to advocate for or against PERL. The intention of this communication is to inform you of the facts related to the election.

## What is PERL?

Revenues from the Public Education \& Recreation Levy (PERL) are used to establish and maintain public recreation places and playgrounds in the public school buildings and grounds of the district. The PERL revenues are also used to provide public educational and recreational activities within the district boundaries and for community education as defined in lowa Code. The levy provides $\$ 0.135$ per $\$ 1,000$ to support public education and recreation opportunities in the Saydel School District. If approved, the tax would take effect for the 2016-2017 school year. There are 23 districts in lowa that currently levy for PERL.

## Why has the public requested a vote for PERL?

Saydel resides in an unincorporated area of Polk County. While we have strong established communities, these communities do not have the incorporated local government of neighboring districts. There is no public entity to support public recreation for younger youth and adult educational opportunities for the general public. While Saydel has a strong and successful history of youth athletic programs, the scope of these programs is limited by available volunteer coordination and funding. In addition, there are no opportunities for the general public to fully utilize our school facilities for recreation and learning.
If approved, PERL will generate approximately $\$ 95,000$ per year (based on yearly valuation) to support:

- Creation, organization and staffing of a community education program.
- Funding to support facility and resource enhancements to areas utilized by the general public for non-school related activities.

By creating a Community Education Program, we intend to:

- Increase access and availability of athletic, fine arts and club programs for K-6 students outside of the school day and year.
- Increase availability for facility use and community learning opportunities for the general public, including creating adult education courses and community engagement opportunities.
- Complement and enhance opportunities for 7-12 students for community engagement and activities.

## What is the estimated tax impact on $\$ 100,000$ home?

The estimated tax impact on a $\$ 100,000$ home is $\$ 6.85$ after residential rollback.

## Why not just start community education programs without assessing the tax?

PERL will give us the funding to create a self-sustaining community education program. Currently, these programs are coordinated by volunteers and exist outside of the Saydel Community School District. Because of this status, the Saydel Schools cannot fully assist in the promotion, organization or operation of these programs. The largest share of any community or private organization is staffing costs. Having paid staff to coordinate volunteers, arrange events and assist in promotion and communication will be essential in increasing opportunities. Community education offerings will have a fee structure, but this fee structure will not be affordable if it must also cover staffing costs. This money can also be used for upgrades of property owned by the school district, but primarily dedicated to public use. Examples include the Woodside baseball fields, Cornell field, and connector trail between schools.
