Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports

As the year has progressed, the Saydel High School staff continues to work hard to ensure that all students are being successful inside and outside of school. Toward that end, around 25-30 students are being requested each day for Flex time to complete make up work, have re-teachings done and complete tests and projects. Each day specific subject areas are able to request students for Flex (Monday-English, Tuesday-Math, Thursday-Science, Friday Social Studies).

If students are not being requested or attending Flex class they are able to sign up for extended

learning opportunities. Various teachers are creating the extended learning opportunities on a monthly basis after polling students. An additional support recently started is our SOAR Time on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 2:45-3:45 PM. This support allows students who are missing work in multiple classes additional time with teachers to complete missing assignments, and/or receive help with any questions they may have.

A goal for the high school this year has been to focus on our Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS). A few of the ways we have worked to do this over the past semester is by continually reinforcing and reteaching school rules and expectations. Additionally the staff has worked to recognize students by passing out activity passes that allow student free entry into one activity, nominating four Students of the Month for a free Smokey D's lunch, and by sending home PBIS postcards to communicate positive behavior.

The increased opportunity for positive recognition has helped build a positive culture in the school so far this school year. As the year continues, the staff and activities department will continue to develop more ways to recognize students who are demonstrating positive behavior in and outside of school. As an additional recognition for staff the students are also nominating a staff member each month to go with the Students of the Month. The staff and students of the month so far have been:

Season Greetings from the Saydel Guidance Department! As this calendar year and Semester come to a close I want to remind students to finish strong before their first semester ends. Like taking any standardized tests such as the PSAT, ACT, or Iowa Assessments, semester tests may be daunting to many.

Here are some tips that students and parents may find useful in preparing for the semester exams:

- Encourage your child to do well but don't pressure him/her. You may stress him/her out. It is important for your child to stay relaxed for the test.
- Keep a positive attitude about tests.
- Make sure that your child gets enough sleep the nights before testing
- Ensure that your child eats a healthy breakfast and avoid heavy foods that may make him/her groggy. Protein and fiber will help your student stay full and focused.
- Drink plenty of water and eat water filled fruits and vegetables.
- Avoid high sugar foods that may make him/her hyper and/or crashing.
- Make sure your child gets up early enough so that he/she will be on time to school.
- Talking about the test with your child can relieve stress.
- Encourage your child to do his/her best!

I would also like to highlight some upcoming events that will take place in January. If your student needs to take the ACT, the deadline for the February 10 test date is January 12. If they are needing assistance with the registration please have them make an appointment in the guidance office. January will also mark the pre-registration for the DMACC Career Academies for the 2018-2019 school year. The Academies are special programs offered to juniors and seniors that allows them to earn college credit while in high school, develop valuable career and workplace skills, explore various options of interest, and get a head start on college career.

There are approximately 15 Academies; some of the popular ones are the Health Occupations (CNA), Auto Collision, Auto Technology, and Culinary Arts. DMACC has added three new Academies: Cyber Security, Accounting, and Fire Science/EMT. More information in regards to preregistration will be sent out in January. Please remind your student to check their emails. If you or your student would like more information about the Career Academies you may visit the online site: www.dmacc.edu/careeradvantage.

Principles of Management Class News

The Principles of Management course project is designed to give students an opportunity to apply management principles through the development and implementation of project management skills. Ideally, each project created will have different roles for the students to fill, such as role of project manager, role of marketing, and team member.

The nature of the projects will vary from group to group; however, each project must meet the following criteria:

- The project's scope should be of sufficient size so that each student is engaged in planning, executing, evaluating, and closing project activities throughout the semester in which the student is enrolled in Principles of Management.
- The completed project must have benefited the school, community, local nonprofit organization, or local business.

From November 6-10, students in the Principles of Management hosted a clean up time during Flex. The overall goal was to pick up trash on school grounds before the winter sport seasons started. Students spent four days during cold weather walking different areas of school property picking up trash.

Saydel High School Senior Trevor Sprague stated, "We worked together successfully and improved the look of our school. We want our local community to be proud of the Saydel Eagles."



Saydel Eagle Endowment

The Saydel Eagle Endowment (SEE), formerly known as Saydel Dollars for Scholars, was started in 2001 by a group of parents to raise money to provide scholarships to graduating seniors who were continuing their education at colleges and universities, area colleges, and trade schools. 2017 marked our 15th year of awarding scholarships to all students who completed the application process, which includes a written form and an in-person interview. We have an endowment fund in excess of \$175,000, which continues to grow from ongoing donations and investment growth.

This year we received donations from several sources, including the Saydel Homecoming Parade, the Monster Dash, and various individuals. We were especially pleased to work with a donor to honor their mother who graduated from Woodside High School, and another donor to honor the memory of a long-time high school teacher who made a positive impact on students. Another donation we were pleased to receive came from the mother of a current Cornell Elementary School teacher.

SEE is a non-profit organization under the laws of Iowa. We provide the same scholarship amount to all students, regardless of academic performance or financial need. The money is sent directly to the college or university after the student confirms his/her registration for fall classes.

The Brothers Grimm Spectaculathon

What's it take to make a play?

Those students involved sum it up as laughter, knowledge, OPPORIUNITY, RISK, and NEW MENDS.

On November 2 & 3, the Saydel Drama Department presented the play, "The Brothers Grimm Spectaculathon". It included a retelling of favorite tales including *Cinderella, Snow White, Rapunzel, The Frog Prince,* and *Hansel and Gretel*. However, this retelling had many twists from what we might know. Some of those twists were due the actors questioning the motivation of certain characters, and others were due to performing the tales with aspects of the originals instead of the animated movie versions many people know.

Laughter

The play was hilarious, as evidenced by the audience reactions. The students also spent a great deal of time laughing as they were rehearsing the show. Senior Trent Guy said, "I laughed every single day." This theme was also reiterated by seniors Trevor Sprague and Cameron Leeper. Trevor said, "I have had a blast with the group of people I had the opportunity to do this with," while Cameron said, "I really enjoyed doing this play."

New Experiences Beyond Comfort Zone

"The Brothers Grimm Spectaculathon" involved a wide range of students who numbered 35 for the cast and 12 for the crew. Of the thirty-five cast members, only six had previously appeared on the Saydel High School stage. Trevor Sprague, who was one of the first-time actors, expressed his interest by saying, "Since it is my senior year, I wanted to try something new, step out of my comfort zone." This may have been the sentiment shared by other seniors who were on stage for the first time including Cody Boozell, Hannah Bowman, Bryce Campbell, Jhonelson DelaCruz, Cameron Leeper, and Katie Schmidt. It speaks volumes about these students who were ready to leave fear behind and try something completely new.

Knowledge

There was a great deal of new knowledge for those performing in their first drama production. These twentynine were learning about acting terms, stage terms, character development, timing, and the important role that costumes and props play. Junior Gabby Neddermeyer commented, "I learned a lot about theatre and stage presence."

New Friends

When students were asked what they enjoyed about working on the play, their first answer was about enjoying all of the laughter together, and that it was fun. The next answer was shared almost unanimously – making new friends. Many commented on how the play brought them together with a whole new group of people they didn't know before. The chance to meet new people also meant the chance to make new friends. Most said that they even made strong new friendships that they feel will be lasting.

Thanks for taking the risk to try theatre. It is gratifying to hear the comments from the students and know that they tried something new, made new friends, and learned they had talents they didn't realize they possessed. The part that really makes it worthwhile is knowing they had a lot of fun and laughter along the way.


