HEALTH REMINDERS

Immunization Requirements for Incoming 7th & 12th Graders

State law requires all incoming 7th grade students to have updated immunization records on file at the school prior to school beginning. If your child is entering 7th grade, make sure they have Tdap and Meningococcal vaccine before school begins. Updated immunization records can be brought to the district during registration or Back to School Night.

All incoming 9th grade students should have an updated dental screening on file at the school prior to school beginning. If your child is entering 9th grade, make sure they have a dental screening by a hygienist or dentist before school begins. Updated records can be brought to the district during registration.

If your child is planning on participating in extracurricular athletics during the 2018-19 school year, please ensure a physical is on file in the athletic director's office.

Exciting Changes for 2018-19 School Year

I hope this letter finds you and your family well. The 2018-19 school year is quickly approaching, so I want to take a moment to share with you relevant information for the start of the school year.

Foremost, welcome to the new school year. I look forward to learning more about and working with the returning students and families. I also welcome our new students and families

to Woodside. We hope the transition to Woodside is a smooth and positive experience.

Woodside students will experience a subtle change in their schedule this year. Each year, Woodside students participate in a 24 question Gallop Student Poll that measures student engagement, hope, entrepreneurial aspirations, and career/financial literacy. Based on recent survey results, a committee of teachers was formed during the 2017-18 school year to problem solve ways to improve the areas of growth identified in the survey.

A solution that I am looking forward to implementing during the new school year is the addition of a time called Connect. Each student will begin their school day in Connect for 12 minutes. This time will serve multiple purposes, including having an adult advocate in the building, improve communication on school related opportunities, support each student with academic accountability, and build a sense of community amongst a group of students. I am anxious to see how our students will grow to appreciate this time and develop essential life long skills.

The custodians and some contractors have been working hard over the summer to improve the learning space at Woodside. These upgrades include a new roof over the 6th grade wing, LED lighting in all the hallways, fresh paint in several common spaces, acoustical tiles in the music room, furniture in some classrooms, and new signage in various locations. We hope the changes to our physical space enhance the learning experience for each student.

We have a number of new staff and/or staff assuming new roles this year. The teachers joining the Woodside team from outside the district are Ashley Schooley (Family Consumer Science), Steven Fisher (5th and 6th Grade Technology), Marti Van Walbeek (Special Education), Alex Carr (5th Grade Teacher), Thurston Gable (7th Grade Social Studies), Lorissa Baker (Special Education), Anayolonda Torres Pinto (7th and 8th Grade Spanish), Steven Witmer (Librarian), Mackenzie Osborn (Nurse) and Jackie Houge (Secretary).



In a few weeks, we will have hundreds of students walking through our doors eager to start another school year. With each new year there is always a sense of fresh starts, continued success and new discoveries. We are excited to seize that momentum and engage students in learning and experiences that will inspire them to do great things with their lives.

Throughout this year I have a goal of highlighting the

success, both past and present, of Saydel High School. These highlights will be happening as we start the year to help seize the positive momentum. As we highlight these great accomplishments, we will be able to see the impact that Saydel High School has had on individuals and our community as a whole. WE ARE SAYDEL and there is a lot to be proud of within our community, within our students and within our staff.

New Student Opportunities

We have several new course offerings for our students to further prepare themselves for life after high school:

- *Probabilty and Statistics This is a semester-long, upper level math class that will be challenging students to use math to evaluate the world in intriguing ways.
- *Computer Science Essentials This year-long course will expose students to computer science fundamentals and skills. Students will use both block coding and various languages to put their designs into practice.
- *Computer Science Principles This course aligns with AP Computer Science and students will have the opportunity to take the AP test for this course. Students will be working with app development, cyber security and simulations.
- *Pre-apprenticeship Students will begin work toward an apprenticeship program in a chosen career. The intent is that this course will partner students with an employer and progress through a half of year in a four-year apprenticeship program.
- *Environmental Science Students will be studying how humans interact with the natural world. It will examine effects of human actions on the environment and how policies and decisions influence human actions.

New Student/Freshman Orientation

Each year students embark on a new chapter of their educational careers by entering high school. Both new students and parents may experience anxiety over the transition to high school. Our goal at Saydel High School is to make the transition into high school as smooth and positive as possible. In order to help students and parents ease into the high school, we will be hosting a new student orientation on August 21 at 6:00 PM. The goals of this orientation are to allow students and parents to find classrooms, meet teachers, meet student leaders, find lockers, and ask questions. Students and parents will accomplish this by walking through a shortened schedule to get a brief experience of a school day. If you have a new student, 9th grader or new to the high school, please attend the orientation.

Curriculum, Instruction & Assessment Update

Director of Curriculum, Instruction & Assessment Mary Salazar



As we look to the start of the 2018-19 school year, it is hard to believe that summer has come to an end. I hope this update finds you all rested and ready for the new school year. I wanted to take a moment to acknowledge all the hard work teachers have continued to put in around our ongoing district priorities and give some insight into the work that will continue for this upcoming school year.

The 2017-18 school was a busy one for teachers as usual. This past school year marked our second year working to create learning targets for the Iowa Core standards taught. These learning targets continue to be crafted with student and teacher in mind. Each standard is broken down into a set of four learning targets that teachers and students can use to assess mastery toward the goal of student performance at or above the standard as written. Teachers also spent continued time and energy in designing assessments that both challenge and engage students. As any of our teachers will attest, balanced and rigorous assessment creation aligned to standards is truly a difficult

task so we will continue this learning and work as a district as we move forward.

The start of a new school year also means a recommitment to the TAP System. TAP master teachers will be hard at work again this year designing and delivering weekly cluster meetings for all K-12 teachers. Building TAP Leadership Teams (made up of building principals, master and mentor teachers) began this work over the summer by looking at student assessment data to identify trends. Assessments used include Iowa Assessments and MAP at Woodside and the High School and aReading, aMath, FAST and Iowa Assessments at Cornell. These trends in student performance were used to create school goals for increased student achievement.

The design of these school goals ensures that each weekly cluster meeting is student-focused and data-driven, keeping student growth at the center of all decisions made. TAP Leadership Teams select specific student and teacher strategies to focus on during each cluster cycle of the year. Each week, teachers work diligently on mastering these strategies with the goal of increasing reading and math achievement in all three buildings.

As you can see we have been hard at work and that work and dedication will continue for the 2018-19 school year.

Steven Witmer Joins Saydel as New District Librarian

Steven Witmer will be joining the Saydel team this fall as the new District Teacher Librarian. He will be working at all three schools and is looking forward to meeting and getting to know all of the staff and students that make up Saydel's community.

He attended the University of Northern Iowa, where he earned his Bachelor's degree in History Education and his Masters in School Library Studies. Student Services & Special Education Update

I am very excited to begin my fifth year in the district. The 2017-18 school year allowed for specific focus in the areas of special education curriculum implementation, the restructure of our District Social Work support system, and a continued focus on Multi-Tiered Systems of Support, otherwise known as MTSS.

This summer has been busy with Eagle's Nest in full swing. Eagle's Nest Coordinator Alivia Bullis has

been very busy with a variety of activities that included both play and academic time. In June, the children participated in field trips to Merle Hay Lanes, Des Moines Art Center, Poppajohns Sculpture Park, DoJos Family Martial Arts, Jester Park and weekly trips to the various splash pads around the Des Moines area. July and August will be filled with similar activities.

The Eagle's Nest before and after school program will begin August 23, 2018, and will be structured with age appropriate activities that include hands-on learning, free play, sports and games, and a homework lab. The Eagle's Nest office is located across from the cafeteria at Cornell Elementary. Feel free to contact Alivia for enrollment information at 515-263-3037 or call Cornell at 515-244-8173, ext.3141.

The 2018-19 school year will begin the process of focusing on Trauma Informed Care and the social/emotional component of education. The At-Risk department will begin the foundational process for building understanding in this area while continuing to create a solid MTSS model for all our schools. This work will allow for a tiered approach to identifying and supporting diverse learners within the general education setting as well as within small group instruction. The focus will include both academic and behavioral supports. We will also continue our work with Positive Behavior Intervention and Supports (PBIS) across the district. This will include a focus on preventative and responsive approaches with all students in the classroom. A more intensive intervention with individual strategies will be implemented within our Tier 2 model at Cornell.

A New Year Begins for Cornell's Preschool Program

The Cornell Preschool Program would like to welcome back new and returning families and students for the 2018-19 school year! We hope you have had a relaxing and fun summer.

The Cornell Preschool Program is a safe and caring environment where your child will be able to learn through play and become creative, confident thinkers. We are excited to meet your children and learn, play, and grow together this school year.

Here are a few reminders for the beginning of the school year. The first day of preschool will be September 4. Our 3-year-old program runs from 8:45-11:15 AM. We have both morning and afternoon sessions for our 4-year-old program. Our morning 4-year-old program runs from 8:45-11:45 AM. Our afternoon 4-year-old program runs from 12:15-3:15 PM. All preschool programs are held Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday.

Prior to your child starting preschool there are a few requirements. If your child is enrolled in our 3-year-old program, you will need to attend a parent meeting on

August 24 at 10:00 AM in the Cornell cafeteria. Please bring your child along with you to see the classroom. If your child is enrolled in our 4-year-old program, a home visit is required before your child can begin preschool. Home visits are 20 minutes long and will be held during the week of August 27 between school hours of 9:00 AM-3:00 PM. These home visits are a time for your child to meet their teacher and for you to be given information about the preschool program. You will need to sign up for a home visit during Back to School Night which is held August 21 from 4:00 -5:30 PM at Cornell. You and your child can also explore our preschool classrooms during this time.

Research tells us that children who attend a high-quality preschool enter kindergarten with better pre-reading skills, richer vocabularies, and stronger basic math skills than those who do not. We look forward to a great school year!


Saydel Community School Food Services

ANNUAL NOTICE OF NON-DISCRIMINATION

The Saydel Community School District offers career and technical programs in the following areas of study:

It is the policy of the Saydel Community School District not to discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex, disability, religion, creed, age (for employment), marital status (for programs), sexual orientation, gender identity and socioeconomic status (for programs) in its educational programs and its employment practices. There is a grievance procedure for processing complaints of discrimination. GRIEVANCE PROCEDURE

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Students, parents of students, employees, and applicants for employment in the school district have the right to file a formal complaint alleging discrimination. The district has policies and procedures in place to identify and investigate complaints alleging discrimination. If appropriate, the district will take steps to prevent the recurrence of discrimination and to correct its discriminatory effects on the Complainant and others.

A Complainant may attempt to resolve the problem informally by discussing the matter with a building principal or a direct supervisor. However, the Complainant has the right to end the informal process at any time and pursue the formal grievance procedures outlined below. Use of the informal or formal grievance procedure is not a prerequisite to the pursuit of other remedies. Please note that informal processes and procedures are not to be used in certain circumstances (e.g., sexual harassment and sexual assault).

Filing a Complaint

A Complainant who wishes to avail himself/herself of this grievance procedure may do so by filing a complaint with the equity coordinator(s). An alternate will be designated in the event it is claimed that the equity coordinator or superintendent committed the alleged discrimination or some other conflict of interest exists. Complaints shall be filed within 180 days of the event giving rise to the complaint or from the date the Complainant could reasonably become aware of such occurrence. The Complainant will state the nature of the complaint and the remedy requested. The equity coordinator(s) shall assist the Complainant as needed.

Investigation

Within 15 working days, the equity coordinator will begin the investigation of the complaint or appoint a qualified person to undertake the investigation (hereinafter "equity coordinator"). If the Complainant is under 18 years of age, the equity coordinator shall notify his or her parent(s)/guardian(s) that they may attend investigatory meetings in which the Complainant is involved. The complaint and identity of the Complainant, Respondent, or witnesses will only be disclosed as reasonably necessary in connection with the investigation or as required by law or policy. The investigation may include, but is not limited to the following:

- A request for the Complainant to provide a written statement regarding the nature of the complaint;
- A request for the individual named in the complaint to provide a written statement;
- A request for witnesses identified during the course of the investigation to provide a written statement;
- Interviews of the Complainant, Respondent, or witnesses;
- An opportunity to present witnesses or other relevant information; and
- Review and collection of documentation or information deemed relevant to the investigation.

Within 60 working days, the equity coordinator shall complete the investigation and issue a report with respect to the findings. The equity coordinator shall notify the Complainant and Respondent of the decision within 5 working days of completing the written report. Notification shall be by U.S. mail, first class.

Decision and Appeal

The complaint is closed after the equity coordinator has issued the report, unless within 10 working days after receiving the decision, either party appeals the decision to the superintendent by making a written request detailing why he/she believes the decision should be reconsidered. The equity coordinator shall promptly forward all materials relative to the complaint and appeal to the Superintendent. Within 30 working days, the superintendent shall affirm, reverse, amend the decision, or direct the equity coordinator to gather additional information. The Superintendent shall notify the Complainant, Respondent, and the equity coordinator of the decision within 5 working days of the decision. Notification shall be by U.S. mail, first class.

- The decision of the Superintendent shall be final.
- · The decision of the Superintendent in no way prejudices a party from seeking redress through state or federal agencies as provided by in law.
- This policy and procedures are to be used for complaints of discrimination, in lieu of any other general complaint policies or procedures that may
 be available.
- If any of the stated timeframes cannot be met by the district, the district will notify the parties and pursue completion as promptly as possible.
- Retaliation against any person, because the person has filed a complaint or assisted or participated in an investigation, is prohibited. Persons found to have engaged in retaliation shall be subject to discipline by appropriate measures.
