Principal's Message

Is my son or daughter prepared for life after school?

This is one of those questions that keeps me up at night as I think about both my 9 and 5-yearold children. I know this is a concern many parents have as they think about their own high school children; and my guess is, this question is right at the front of the minds of senior parents more frequently than not.

At Saydel High School, we phrase the question,

"Is every student prepared for life after high school?". We ask this question at all grade levels and content areas because we know if we wait until a student's senior year to address this then there are missed opportunities. This is the prime reason the majority of our electives are designed for post-secondary preparation. Within our career and technical classes, the content is aligned to prepare students for both post-secondary education and careers.

These are just a few of the things we offer to help prepare students for life after high school:

- 9th and 12th-grade students engage in financial literacy learning.
- Our industrial tech courses are aligned so students can enter a preapprenticeship program.
- We offer courses that earn both high school and college credit. In fact, last year more than 100 students earned over 750 college credits.
- We offer AP opportunities in Art, Spanish, English, Biology, Government, and Computer Science.
- We focus on teaching essential life skills: self-regulation, organization, and other academic skills.
- Approximately 10% of our senior class is participating in DMACC career academy (nursing, criminal justice, auto technician, tool and die, computer programming)

Junior & Senior Focus

October and November can be very busy months in the lives of seniors preparing for college campus visits, they definitely need to get on campuses to see what colleges have to offer and to see which one is a good fit. After visiting campuses, seniors should begin submitting admission applications to the colleges they are most interested in attending.

It's important to be aware of application deadlines. It is best to have all applications submitted by December 1. Students should make sure they have filled out the FAFSA starting October 1 and be aware of the priority deadlines that each college has to ensure that they are eligible for different scholarship opportunities. If seniors are needing to take or retake the ACT, they will have one more opportunity December 8 with the registration deadline of November 2. The Iowa College Access Network website icansucceed.org is a great resource for narents of any grade level to go to when having questions about for parents of any grade level to go to when having questions about preparing students for post-secondary life. Parents and students can sign up for tips of the week or print yearly calendars detailing what students should be taking to prepare themselves. The website also lists dates of informational sessions about financial aid and college planning.

It's that time of year for juniors and seniors to sign up to take DMACC classes for the spring semester. Students can start taking core college courses now and can begin their college career. This is a great opportunity for students to get a head start on the whole college experience - plus it's free! The deadline for enrollment is Friday, November 16. Students may schedule an appointment in the guidance office.

Finally, I would like to remind parents that they are able to complete the 2019 FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) form. The national program is restructuring and providing more control to individual state programs. 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Career Readiness

As we enter the winter months and first semester begins to wind down, students look forward to the second semester wondering what's to come. Many students will continue working in school taking classes toward graduation, some will go to college for classes to prepare them for a four-year university and others will look at how school can help prepare them for a career after high school. A focus over the past two years has been better preparing students in high school to enter the career or profession they desire immediately after graduating high school. This concept has led us to develop a pre-apprenticeship class within our industrial technology department and to continue encouraging students to attend Career Academy at DMACC.

The pre-apprenticeship program within our industrial technology department is intended to assist students who want to enter into an apprenticeship after high school and helps them develop skills needed to be successful. In order to do this, students take classes the first semester with Mr. Voss, our industrial technology teacher. These classes prepare them for the apprenticeship program. After the completion of the first semester classes, students begin their apprenticeship program during the school day in the fields of HV/AC, electrician or plumbing. This course of study provides students the opportunity to begin their apprenticeship before graduating from high school, which allows them to enter their desired field already prepared. If interested please stop in the front office and talk with Mr. Schulte.

The DMACC Career Academy is located on the Ankeny campus and serves to "provide state-of-the-art career and technical training and college credit to high school students." The goal of the Career Academy is to provide high school students with educational opportunities that combine college-level training and professional skills. The education received in these programs often replaces that of an apprenticeship or training program in fields outside of construction. Career Academy programs include: auto collision, automotive technology, business administration, criminal justice, culinary arts, cybersecurity, diesel technology, fire science/emergency medical technician, health occupations(CNA), machine operations/tool & die, as well as many others. This opportunity allows students to receive training toward their desired field of study before graduating high school. Career Academy programs are year-long half day programs students can attend. Juniors are eligible to attend Career Academy, however, priority is granted to seniors first.

The application process opens in January so if you or your student are interested in either of the programs above, please stop in guidance and talk with Ms. Larson or myself.

Saydel Eagle Endowment

he Saydel Eagle Endowment (SEE), formerly known as Saydel Dollars for Scholars, was started in 2001 by a group of parents to raise money to provide scholarships to graduating seniors who were continuing their education at colleges and universities, area colleges, and trade schools. 2018 marked our 16th year of awarding scholarships to all students who completed the application process, which includes a written form and an in-person interview. We have an endowment fund that continues to grow from ongoing donations and investment growth.



This year we received donations from several sources, including the Saydel Homecoming Parade, the Monster Dash, and various individuals. We were especially pleased to work with a donor to honor their mother who graduated from Woodside High School, and another donor to honor the memory of a long-time high school teacher who made a positive impact on students. Another donation we were pleased to receive came from the mother of a current Cornell Elementary School teacher.

SEE is a non-profit organization under the laws of Iowa. We provide the same scholarship amount to all students, regardless of academic performance or financial need. The money is sent directly to the college or university after the student confirms his/her registration for fall classes.
