

Free Lunch Facts

What's the deal with free lunches?

I'm sure you have noticed that this year's lunch is free for all students, but why do we have free lunch? With further investigation to find out why lunch is free, I interviewed Jessy Sadler, the current Director of Foods and Nutrition Services. Sadler explained, "It's not a grant, it's actually a food program option called CEP." CEP stands for Community Eligibility Provision. It is provided by the USDA (United States Department of Agriculture).

What kind of requirements do we need to get CEP? Sadler further clarified, "48% of students were registering for free lunches." We needed to have at least 40% of students in the prior year register for free lunches. She also added, " Cornell has had it [CEP] for three years."

We have CEP for the next four years. We can re-register for the food program again after it is up as long as we still fulfill the requirements of the program.

FALL FAVORITES

Toffee Crunch Cake

Ingredients: 1 chocolate cake mix, 3 eggs, 1 1/4 cups of milk, 1/2 cup oil, 1 14-oz can sweetened condensed milk, 1 11.5-oz jar salted caramel sauce, 2 cups heavy whipping cream, 2 tablespoons powdered sugar, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract, and 1 8-oz bag Heath candy pieces

Instructions:

Step 1: Preheat oven to 350°F. Spray a 9x13 inch baking dish with nonstick spray.

Step 2: Prepare cake mix according to package directions, using

milk instead of water. Pour batter into prepared dish and bake according to directions on box.

Step 3: Poke holes all over cake. Pour sweetened condensed milk over the cake, making sure to fill the holes.

Step 4: With a mixer, whip the heavy whipping cream for about one minute and spread over the cake. Drizzle with remaining caramel sauce and sprinkle with Heath candy pieces.



Pumpkin Bread



Ingredients: 1 can of pumpkin, 4 eggs, 1 cup of vegetable oil, water, flour, baking soda, salt cinnamon, nutmeg, ground clove, ground ginger

Instructions:

Step 1 : Preheat oven to 350°F, and spray 2 loaf pans with cooking spray.

Step 2: Mix 1 15-ounce can pumpkin, 4 eggs, and 1 cup vegetable oil.

Step 3: Pour ³/₃ cup water and 3 1/2 cups flour in with it.

Step 4: Mix the rest in with it 2 teaspoons baking soda, 1 ½ teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1 teaspoon of ground nutmeg, 1 teaspoon of ground cloves, and ¼ teaspoon of ground ginger.

Step 5 : Bake for 65 minutes.

"I woke up to hear knocking on glass. At first, I thought it was the window until I heard it come from the mirror again." - Reddit


