Greetings Fellow Eagles!
I sincerely hope this correspondence finds you all having an amazing summer filled with time to rejuvenate and you are gearing your family up for another successful school year!

With the start of the year quickly approaching, staff has spent a significant amount of time this summer preparing for the return of our kids. They have engaged in curricular work to ensure our guaranteed and viable curriculum is rigorous, aligned, and well thought out for high level learning; we have worked to train lead teams in our Social, Emotional, Behavioral,

Mental Health (SEBMH) learning to continue moving our organization toward a greater health and success; and staff have engaged in several, more tailored learning opportunities, aligned to their individual building goals, i.e. Standards Referenced Grading, Lucy Caulkins Training, Project Lead the Way/Career Tech Education, Collaborative Problem Solving, Teacher Leadership Compensation (TLC/TAP), Literacy Training, etc.... All of this adult learning will, undoubtedly, increase our capacity to impact student learning and ultimately achievement.

In addition to staff preparing for a great 2019-20 school year, there are facility improvements underway at each school campus. Major projects include the Woodside Classroom Renovations Project (5th grade classrooms and SPED Level III Classroom); Woodside Hot Water Conversion Project (boiler system); and Saydel Tennis Court Project. Also note we have several flooring, lighting (LED), roofing, concrete work and annual maintenance work items being completed over the summer as well. Please look for these campus upgrades as we begin the school year.

The last topic we would appreciate your attention with is our upcoming bond referendum. We will hold a special election, for the bond referendum and vacant board seat, on September 10, 2019 to fund improvements at all three building sites.

The proposed facility improvements are founded on four driving factors:

- 1. Safety of our buildings and ground
- 2. Modernization of the academic learning environment
 - a. Update Instructional Environment
 - b. Enhance Fine Arts Facilities
- 3. Further **market our community** through facility enhancements
- 4. Fiscally manage our resources to maintain current tax rate

The bond referendum will ensure we plan forward, by investing in our community, for the next twenty years, and will be issued for \$20,625,000 in which we will need a supermajority or greater than 60% approval rating. We are confident we can achieve this with "NO TAX INCREASE" and substantially benefit all learners across our district. Furthermore, the timeline for the upgrades falling inside the scope of the project will include an 18-month construction window and will have little impact on learning throughout the school year. Please see our website for additional details and updates as we progress with the referendum.

Thank you to the community for your ongoing support of our work in the district and to our Board Members. As always, if you have questions and/or comments I am happy to take a call or sit down and talk.

HEALTH REMINDERS

Immunization Requirements for Incoming 7th & 12th Graders

State law requires all incoming 7th grade students to have updated immunization records on file at the school prior to school beginning. If your child is entering 7th grade, make sure they have Tdap and Meningococcal vaccine before school begins. Updated immunization records can be brought to the district during registration or Back to School Night.

All incoming 9th grade students should have an updated dental screening on file at the school prior to school beginning. If your child is entering 9th grade, make sure they have a dental screening by a hygienist or dentist before school begins. Updated records can be brought to the district during registration.

If your child is planning on participating in extracurricular athletics during the 2019-20 school year, please ensure a physical is on file in the athletic director's office.







A New Year Begins for Cornell's Preschool Program

The Cornell Preschool Program would like to welcome back new and returning families and students for the 2019-20 school year! We hope you have had a relaxing and fun summer.

The Cornell Preschool Program is a safe and caring environment where your child will be able to learn through play and become creative, confident thinkers. We are excited to meet your children and learn, play, and grow together this school year.

Here are a few reminders for the beginning of the school year. The first day of preschool will be September 5. Our 3-year-old program runs from 8:45-11:15 AM. We have both morning and afternoon sessions for our 4-year-old program. Our morning 4-year-old program runs from 8:30-11:30 AM. Our afternoon 4-year-old program runs from 12:15-3:15 PM. All preschool programs are held Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday.

Prior to your child starting preschool there are a few requirements. If your child is enrolled in our 3-year-old

program, you will need to attend a parent meeting on August 30 at 9:30-10:30 AM in the Cornell cafeteria. Please bring your child along with you to see the classroom. If your child is enrolled in our 4-year-old program, a home visit is required before your child can begin preschool. Home visits are 20 minutes long and will be held during the week of August 26 between school hours of 9:00 AM-3:00 PM. These home visits are a time for your child to meet their teacher and for you to be given information about the preschool program. You will need to sign up for a home visit during Back To School Night which is held August 21 from 4:00 -5:30 PM at Cornell. You and your child can also explore our preschool classrooms during this time.

Research tells us that children who attend a high-quality preschool enter kindergarten with better pre-reading skills, richer vocabularies, and stronger basic math skills than those who do not. We look forward to a great school year!

Most importantly, the Woodside staff hopes you have had an enjoyable summer and eager to have school resume so we can begin working with your child again.

Personally, I look forward to learning more about and working with the returning students and families. I also welcome our new students and families to Woodside and hope the transition to Woodside is seamless.

Once again, Woodside students will experience a significant change upon their return to school due to the large amount of construction work that has been completed to our physical space. Edge Construction and Excel Mechanical have been hard at work making significant changes to common spaces, 5th grade classrooms, and our heating system. The new spaces will bring natural light into interior classrooms, modernize outdated finishes, create personalized learning for our special education students, and improve heating efficiency for our building. I cannot wait until the renovations are complete and students fill the hallways again.

Woodside will now have a full time school-based therapist. This is in partnership with EFR. 


Woodside Back to School Night

Teaching & Learning Update

Director of Teaching & Learning Mary Salazar



As we look to the start of the 2019-20 school year, it is hard to believe that summer has come to an end. I hope this update finds you all rested and ready for the new school year.

I want to take a moment to acknowledge that many of our teachers take time during the summer months to attend classes and workshops to enhance their knowledge. Many of these require travel and time spent away from

families. Saydel teachers attended conferences covering topics such as: Standards Referenced Grading, Advanced Placement, Social Studies, Family and Consumer Science, Project Lead the Way, Suicide Prevention, Collaborative Problem Solving, Reading, Writing, TAP and Social Emotional Learning. Our teachers' dedication to professional growth always impresses me. I can't wait for our students to reap the benefits of this summer work.

The start of a new school year also means a recommitment to the TAP System. TAP master teachers will be hard at work again this year designing and delivering weekly professional development meetings, called cluster, for

all K-12 teachers with assistance from our TAP mentor teacher team. Trends in student performance data (from standardized assessments) are used to create school goals for increased student achievement each year. These goals are at the forefront of master teacher's minds as they develop and plan these weekly cluster meetings.

In other TAP related news, this past March after an exhaustive search, the state of Iowa selected the TAP instructional rubric as the statewide instructional framework. Iowa Department of Education Director Dr. Ryan Wise said about the use of an instructional framework:

"An instructional framework, also known as an instructional rubric or learning progression, creates a common instructional language and vision for quality teaching across an entire school district. Schools that share a common definition of effective teaching are well-positioned to maximize the impact of teacher leaders. By utilizing an instructional rubric, schools create consistency in the support and feedback teachers receive as they improve their practice."

This was great news for us here at Saydel! We have been using the TAP instructional rubric since the 2013-14 school year and know not only the quality of the TAP instructional rubric but the impact it has had on teaching and learning.

Samantha Kluesner has joined the Saydel District as our shared social worker. Saydel partnered with Bondurant to have Samantha work at Woodside Middle School and Saydel High School. 

GRIEVANCE PROCEDURE

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Students, parents of students, employees, and applicants for employment in the school district have the right to file a formal complaint alleging discrimination. The district has policies and procedures in place to identify and investigate complaints alleging discrimination. If appropriate, the district will take steps to prevent the recurrence of discrimination and to correct its discriminatory effects on the Complainant and others.

A Complainant may attempt to resolve the problem informally by discussing the matter with a building principal or a direct supervisor. However, the Complainant has the right to end the informal process at any time and pursue the formal grievance procedures outlined below. Use of the informal or formal grievance procedure is not a prerequisite to the pursuit of other remedies. Please note that informal processes and procedures are not to be used in certain circumstances (e.g., sexual harassment and sexual assault).

Filing a Complaint

A Complainant who wishes to avail himself/herself of this grievance procedure may do so by filing a complaint with the equity coordinator(s). An alternate will be designated in the event it is claimed that the equity coordinator or superintendent committed the alleged discrimination or some other conflict of interest exists. Complaints shall be filed within 180 days of the event giving rise to the complaint or from the date the Complainant could reasonably become aware of such occurrence. The Complainant will state the nature of the complaint and the remedy requested. The equity coordinator(s) shall assist the Complainant as needed.

Investigation

Within 15 working days, the equity coordinator will begin the investigation of the complaint or appoint a qualified person to undertake the investigation (hereinafter "equity coordinator"). If the Complainant is under 18 years of age, the equity coordinator shall notify his or her parent(s)/guardian(s) that they may attend investigatory meetings in which the Complainant is involved. The complaint and identity of the Complainant, Respondent, or witnesses will only be disclosed as reasonably necessary in connection with the investigation or as required by law or policy. The investigation may include, but is not limited to the following:

- A request for the Complainant to provide a written statement regarding the nature of the complaint;
- A request for the individual named in the complaint to provide a written statement;
- A request for witnesses identified during the course of the investigation to provide a written statement;
- Interviews of the Complainant, Respondent, or witnesses;
- An opportunity to present witnesses or other relevant information; and
- Review and collection of documentation or information deemed relevant to the investigation.

Within 60 working days, the equity coordinator shall complete the investigation and issue a report with respect to the findings. The equity coordinator shall notify the Complainant and Respondent of the decision within 5 working days of completing the written report. Notification shall be by U.S. mail, first class.

Decision and Appeal

The complaint is closed after the equity coordinator has issued the report, unless within 10 working days after receiving the decision, either party appeals the decision to the superintendent by making a written request detailing why he/she believes the decision should be reconsidered. The equity coordinator shall promptly forward all materials relative to the complaint and appeal to the Superintendent. Within 30 working days, the superintendent shall affirm, reverse, amend the decision, or direct the equity coordinator to gather additional information. The Superintendent shall notify the Complainant, Respondent, and the equity coordinator of the decision within 5 working days of the decision. Notification shall be by U.S. mail, first class.

- The decision of the Superintendent shall be final.
- The decision of the Superintendent in no way prejudices a party from seeking redress through state or federal agencies as provided by in law.
- This policy and procedures are to be used for complaints of discrimination, in lieu of any other general complaint policies or procedures that may
 be available.
- If any of the stated timeframes cannot be met by the district, the district will notify the parties and pursue completion as promptly as possible.
- Retaliation against any person, because the person has filed a complaint or assisted or participated in an investigation, is prohibited. Persons found to have engaged in retaliation shall be subject to discipline by appropriate measures.
