These themes are supported by three objectives.

#### The District non-negotiable goals are:

- 3. Maximize the use of resources
- 4. Demonstrate innovation (NEW)

#### Our intended outcomes for this plan are as follows:

- 1. Our students will be college and career ready upon graduation.
- 2. Our students will demonstrate excellence in the core and extended curriculum.
- 3. Our students will demonstrate active participation as citizens of their schools, community, state, nation, and world.

- 4. Our students will demonstrate a minimum of one year academic growth each year, resulting in proficiency in math, reading and science.
- 5. Our students will be socially, emotionally and academically engaged in their school life.
- 6. Our students will participate in an experience beyond the regular school day/ program that will enhance their engagement in school and development as a citizen.
- 7. Our students will graduate from high school.

The Board has been and will continue to be highly engaged in the development of this plan. It provides a clear direction for our actions as well as specific measurements for success. Upon final approval, the full plan will be available on our website.

My overview of this plan left me little space to speak to the specific things we will be doing this year to begin realizing the intended outcomes of this plan for continuous improvement. 



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## Curriculum, Instruction & Assessment (CIA) Update for Cornell Elementary School

English/Language/Arts

Cornell students and teachers started teaching and learning English Language Arts through the Wheatley Portfolio last fall and this work will continue this fall. The Wheatley Portfolio provides a foundation for designing thematic units that are based on the core standards and supported by great works of children's literature. Some of the Wheatley themes include: "The Five Senses", "Growing a Garden", "America Then and Now" and "Lessons from Leaders." The themes allow teachers to make interdisciplinary connections between reading and writing and STEM, social studies, the fine arts, and PE, providing a context for learning reading, writing, language, and speaking and listening skills. Students will also continue to receive one-on-one and small group instruction through guided reading groups and will be supported as they read independently through conferring with their teachers. In addition, Cornell rolled out a new writing curriculum in 2014-15, and teachers will continue to teach students both fiction and non-fiction writing. Students will learn to write stories, arguments, and informational descriptions.

#### Math

Teachers delved into a new math curriculum last year called Investigations. This math curriculum is based on real-life problem solving scenarios and provides students with a conceptual understanding in math that is grounded in mathematical practices, like developing reasoning, accuracy, and perseverance.

#### Science

Last spring, teachers adopted the Picture Perfect Science curriculum. This fun curriculum connects science to reading and hands-on scientific learning experiences, and teachers are looking forward to introducing more of these units this fall.

#### **Social Studies**

Later this fall, teachers will adopt the "Bringing Social Studies Alive" curriculum that allows students to experience history, geography, government, civics, and economics first-hand through fun simulations and projects. Students will learn about their community and the world around them.

#### Spanish

Students in K-2 will be learning Spanish every day this coming year through songs, games, plays, and word work, and we will eventually expand this teacher's position to include 3rd-4th in 2016-17.

#### **Technology**

A new technology curriculum will be introduced to all students, but with 3rd-4th graders receiving more instruction through a 45 minute class every four days. The technology curriculum will focus on internet safety, digital citizenship, technological skills, and eventually coding.

#### PE, Fine Arts & Music

Our new fine arts and music teachers will be connecting their instruction to reading, writing, math, STEM, and social studies. Our wonderful PE teacher will continue to make connections to the PE SHAPE standards and thematic reading units when it makes sense to do so.

#### Assessment

We will continue to periodically and regularly assess students against grade level standards and expectations. By second trimester, parents will be able to access students' assessment and assignment scores through Power School. Scores and grading will be directly tied to the Iowa Core standards, which will mean that the report card looks slightly more detailed.

### What do we do if students' learning gets ahead or behind grade level?

We have developed a new Multi-Tiered System of Support to assist students that fall behind grade level. This additional time with an interventionist is intended to be fluid and allow students to "dip in and out" of extra help only as needed. We will continue to strengthen our Extended Learning Program staring at the fourth grade. Nevertheless, teachers will continue to differentiate for students' needs in the classroom.

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### **Cornell Preschool Program News for 2015-16**

The Cornell Preschool Program would like to welcome back new and returning families and students for the 2015-16 school year! We hope you have had a relaxing and fun summer. The Cornell Preschool Program is a safe and caring environment where your child will be able to learn through play and become creative, confident thinkers. We are excited to meet your children and learn, play, and grow together this school year!

Here are a few reminders for the beginning of the school year. The first day of preschool will be Monday, August 31. Our 3-yr-old preschool runs from 8:45 am - 11:15 am. Our 4-year-old preschool runs from 12:15 pm - 3:15 pm. Both preschool programs are held Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday. Prior to your child starting preschool there are a few requirements.

If your child is enrolled in our 3-year-old program, you will need to attend a parent meeting on August 25 at 10 am in the Cornell cafeteria. Please bring your child along with you to see the classroom.

If your child is enrolled in our 4-year-old program a home visit is required before your child can begin preschool. Home visits are 20 minutes long and are held August 25-28 during school hours.

These home visits are a time for your child to meet their teacher and for you to be given information about the preschool program. You will need to sign up for your home visit time slot during Supply Night which is August 24 from 5:30 pm - 7 pm at Cornell. You and your child can also explore our preschool classrooms during this time!

Research tells us that children who attend a high-quality preschool enter kindergarten with better pre-reading skills, richer vocabularies, and stronger basic math skills than those who do not. We look forward to a great year!

# Curriculum, Instruction & Assessment (CIA) Update for Woodside Middle School

Over the last few years, Saydel has experienced a substantial amount of change. The District will be entering the third year of implementation of TAP. Each year, the TAP process allows our teachers the opportunity to improve instructional practices through weekly job embedded professional development, administrator and peer coaching, and teacher reflection.

Extensive time was spent last year reviewing Woodside curriculum. Dr. Simone Alekno, Director of Curriculum, Instruction & Assessment, led teachers through curriculum mapping process and supporting materials review. Through the review process, we recognized that many of the support resources for our teachers were either outdated or misaligned and did not support best practices.

As a result, multiple new curriculum supporting resources will be used for the first time this year. Some of the changes include:

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### AUGUST 24: Back To School Night at Woodside

- Walk daily schedules to practices daily logistics.
- Expose each family to the vast opportunities at Woodside.

### Progess Toward Enhanced Learning Continues



Even though classrooms were not filled with students during the summer, Saydel High School's progress toward enhanced learning experiences continued. Teachers met during the summer to further expand their curriculum and assessment knowledge. We are excited for students to return, so we can put our work into action

and continue progress toward preparing each student for life after high school.

This school year students will have the opportunity to engage in a variety of new experiences. Along with these new experiences, we will continue working with students on developing personal goals to provide a basis for continual growth. Our students, along with all staff members, will also be striving to achieve school-wide goals based on reading and math. These school goals will focus to improve upon our achievement last year where we had the largest percentage of students proficient in reading that we have had over the past 10 years. The skills that we strive to develop are those essential for continued success after high school.

In order to help us achieve these school wide goals, I have set personal goals for my work within Saydel High School.

- 1. Increase the quantity and quality of all forms of communication about student progress.
- 2. Utilize every minute we have with students to help them progress toward their goals through engaging learning experiences.
- 3. Increase opportunities for students to have a voice within their school.

This school year will undoubtedly be a great one as we continue to expand and enhance opportunities for all students.

#### **Maximizing Learning Time**

As we enter a new school year, we are adjusting our schedule of classes to provide opportunities for enhanced learning. These changes come after two years of exploring schedule options with the high school staff. Not only does this schedule provide for enhanced opportunities, it also does not eliminate any of the opportunities that were in place with our previous schedule.

#### What remains the same?

- Students will be enrolled in 8 periods each semester
- We will continue to have an afternating A, B schedule to accommodate physical education and study hall.
- Each student continues with the academic support teacher from the previous year.

#### What's new with the schedule?

- On Thursdays we will have the 4 (odd periods), 88 minute classes. On Friday, we will have the even numbered classes that will also be 88 minutes. This extended period provides some great learning opportunities ranging from additional 1 on 1 support to opportunities for creative projects to more learning time.
- Academic support time will take place twice a week. These two, 30 minute sessions provide opportunities for students to get help with from any teacher as well as opportunities to monitor student goal setting and academic progress.
- We will be run our lunches more efficiently by offering two lunch periods instead of three. This adjustment will increase instructional time for students. While the cafeteria will be a little more full we will be providing some outdoor seating on the nice days as well as other ways to accommodate seating.

### New Opportunities for Saydel High School Students

This fall we are expanding opportunities to further prepare our students for life after high school. These new experiences will enhance both core requirements and elective choices for students. As a part of our goal of preparing every student for life after high school, we are developing programs of study. These career pathways will encourage students to have earn certifications or college credit in career interest areas.

Our business department is offering the High School of Business Program. Saydel has been selected as one of three schools in the state of Iowa to utilize this curriculum. These engaging courses will offer students the opportunity to graduate high school with the possibility for college credit or an ASK (Assessment of Skills of Knowledge for Business) certification.

We are also expanding our engineering courses by offering Principles of Engineering. This course engages students in high levels of thinking utilizing physics, math, construction, and many other content areas. This class follows Introduction to Engineering Design in our engineering course offerings.

Our art department will be offering a series of graphic design courses. These two courses offer students the opportunity to earn college credit and explore interests in a design field that touch most everything we see from wall paper patterns to product advertisements.

A new opportunity for 9th graders will engage our newest high school students in learning centered on goal-setting, planning for life after high-school, skills of successful people, financial management, and service learning. This course will develop skills that successful people use on a daily basis and help begin planning for post-secondary opportunities.

We are ratcheting up our English Language Arts classes to bring more focus to all aspects of reading, writing, and speaking communication. This is being accomplished through our partial implementation of the Wheatley Curriculum. These curricular changes work to provide a better alignment to the Iowa Core Curriculum standards.

Within our math department we are adjusting how we support students that need additional help. This year we are introducing Power Algebra as a way to accelerate students up to grade level expectations. This class will utilize small group, individual, and internet-based learning to ensure we reach all students.

2014-15 was a banner year for Saydel Activities. Our marching band, color guard, concert band, and choirs had outstanding seasons bringing home Division I ratings and championships again. Saydel began a robotics team that went all the way to the state championships. Saydel speech received Division I ratings and competed very well at the state level. All sports teams saw improvement from the year prior

and many records were set. The Eagles saw teams raise the bar every season. This summer the softball and baseball teams both finished the regular season ranked in 3A. This spring, the boys track team finished 9th in the state

season ranked in 3A. This spring, the boys track team finished 9th in the state while the girls came in 20th overall. ### Why Do We Charge for Middle School Events?

Each middle school football game costs a minimum of \$180 in officials' fees. Volleyball and softball games cost a minimum of \$110, and basketball and baseball games cost a minimum of \$120. Wrestling costs a minimum of \$60 and track costs a minimum of \$95.

Additionally, we need to provide equipment or pay participation fees for competition.

We greatly appreciate your attendance and support of our 7th and 8th graders. These programs are great feeders into our high school activities and provide extra benefits to your child's educational experience.

## SPECIAL EDUCATION & STUDENT SERVICES UPDATE BY STUDENT SERVICES DIRECTOR JULIE MCKIBBEN

The 2014-15 year brought some exciting changes for the Special Education Department at Saydel Community School District. The first change included the implementation of co-teaching. Teachers received foundational training throughout the school year to provide an inclusive model of service to our special education students.

As the school year progressed, the data revealed improvement in special education goal areas using this model. Co-teaching will continue this school year along with training and support from our District co-teaching facilitator, Jen Husen. Jen will provide strategies for teachers to support students in the inclusion model.

Another area of focus for special education included implementing more specialized programs for behavior and intellectual disabilities. The programs were introduced at Cornell Elementary, delivering intensive student supports. These programs will continue for the upcoming school year, and we will add a program at Woodside Middle School in the area of behavioral supports. The high school added a workability program for special education students. This program will be a continued priority.

- Work and Life Skill Training

In the area of student services, last year brought a focus on program analysis for student services. This included the English Language Learners (ELL) program, the Extended Learning Program (ELP), the At-Risk program, the guidance program, the nursing program, and the social/emotional health of our staff and student body.

This year we will use the information to increase educational opportunities for all students. The ELL program will include a new teacher as well as current curricular materials and a District committee to support the District LAU plan, which supports the delivery of instruction to ELL students. The ELP program will include teacher supports for co-teaching and inclusion and the At-Risk program will allow for various opportunities of support for unique learners.

When looking at the social/emotional health of all students and staff, the District will introduce monthly themes to support a variety of topics at all grade levels, utilizing our nurses, counselors, and Student Assistance Program (SAP). The monthly theme will be posted on the District website.

Bullying and harassment have been a strong focus both last school year and moving forward this school year. The District policy regarding bullying/harassment has been revised as well as clearly defined procedures for following the policy and discipline for founded cases. The work this school year will include educating both students and staff on the impact of bullying/harassment and on the policies and procedures for the District.

It is exciting to begin the second year of work for Special Education and Student Services. There has been much accomplished and yet so much still to complete. Please contact me at the District Office for any special education/student service needs.

## CURRICULUM, INSTRUCTION & ASSESSMENT UPDATE BY DIRECTOR OF CIA DR. SIMONE ALEKNO

We are excited to welcome students to the 2015-16 school year. Our students' needs, interests, and goals provide the mission for our work as educators. This school year, we will continue to strive to keep students at the center of all that we do by providing curriculum, instruction, and assessment that establishes an engaging, authentic, standards-based, and fun learning environment. The following is what students and teachers have to look forward to in 2015-16:

### Our curricula will embed these principles and practices:

- Reading, math, science, and social studies programs of study are aligned from PK-12. Alignment work will continue this year in Spanish, Fine Arts, PE, and in Careers Technical Education.
- Building knowledge, skills, and conceptual understanding through explicit instruction will be balanced with students learning through discovery and inquiry.
- All curricula already is or will be solidly based and planned backward from core and national learning standards, or grade level end-of-year expectations.
- Our curricula will increasingly provide opportunities for students to engage in authentic, engaging, provocative, and fun learning opportunities.
- Further development of our curricula will be guided by our Curriculum Development Facilitators, or those teachers who were hired to lead other teachers in developing curriculum, instruction, and assessment under Iowa's Teacher Leadership grant.

### Look for the following in each of the subject areas during the 2015-16 school year:

- All students in the District will participate in the corebased Wheatley curriculum in English Language Arts. Wheatley emphasizes fostering a love for reading and writing through the use of interesting and critically acclaimed texts and thematic units designed to engage student interest.
- In math, students will continue to not only learn their math facts fluently, but to also reason and persist in solving real life problems that require the use of math in the real world.
- In social studies, new curricula will be introduced K-8th this year and later for high school students that emphasizes bringing history, geography, government, and civics alive in the classroom through hands-on learning experiences.
- In science, students will increasingly engage in the scientific practices that real professionals in science, technology, engineering, and math use on a day-to-day basis, including investigating and problem solving.
- We are introducing a new technology curriculum with an increased and earlier emphasis on technology skills building starting in kindergarten.
- We are introducing Spanish to grades K-2 and 7-8 for

- 2015-16. All students in the district will learn Spanish in 2016-17, with the hope that students are graduated from Saydel High School fluent in Spanish. Spanish fluency is a capacity that has been identified as giving students an edge in the workforce and in college.
- In addition, we are increasing offerings in Fine Arts, Family and Consumer Science, and Industrial Technology and these new courses include an emphasis on college and career readiness.
- We are also preparing to increase our Pre-Advanced Placement and Advanced Placement courses.

#### Instruction

- We will continue to reinforce excellent teaching and to refine areas of teaching in need of improvement through the TAP system and TAP rubric. Our TAP Master Teachers will be invaluable in this process.
- We will continue to emphasize the gradual release of responsibility in learning, by modeling learning strategies and then allowing students to practice them multiple times in multiple contexts. This gradual release model allows students to do more of the "heavy lifting" of learning.
- In addition, through our adjusted start Wednesday professional development days, we will further develop all teachers' capacity to teach students to write through our Writing to Learn program.
- Teachers will also, be provided with guidance on pacing lessons, adding energizers to lessons, and chunking material, so that instructional time is maximized and learning is most accessible for students.

#### Assessment & Feedback

- Our teachers are in agreement that our students deserve feedback about their learning that is fair, accurate, helpful, and timely. Thus, we will further pursue developing understanding of standards-referenced grading and establish a district task force that includes parent and student feedback and input regarding grading and feedback.
- Teachers will learn more about designing formative assessments that allow them to gauge how their students are doing on a day-to-day basis. In addition, support and time will be provided to pre-teach and reteach students that need additional support.
- Teachers and school leaders will continue to analyze Iowa
   Assessments and MAP and Children's Progress data to
   monitor if students are making expected progress. However,
   this year, through a restructured Multi-Tiered System of
   Support, students and parents should see a more systematic
   method and increased communication when it comes to
   assisting students when they struggle.

I am looking forward to an exciting and productive school year with a lot of new ideas and a focus on refining our previous work. Please let me know if you have questions.
