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Breakfast Makes Champions

Scientific research continues to show that eating breakfast is one simple habit that provides numerous health benefits. A balanced breakfast ensures long-lasting energy and promotes a healthy eating pattern for the whole day. Studies show that people who consume a morning meal tend to eat fewer calories and less saturated fat and cholesterol.

A good breakfast consists of at least three food groups:

- Grains, Breads + cereals whole wheat bagel, whole grain toast or oatmeal
- Vegetables OR Fruits- Bell peppers, orange slices or grapes
- Milk + Milk Products OR Meat, Beans + Nuts- Low fat or fat free milk, yogurt, breakfast sausage or walnut

Easy to find ingredients and fun to prepare for families. Prep time:5 minutes Cooking time: 10 minutes INGREDIENTS

- 2 eggs
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
- 1/2 cup non-fat or 1% milk
- 1/4 cup applesauce
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 6 slices whole wheat bread
- 2 teaspoons white sugar

DIRECTIONS

- 1. In a large mixing bowl, combine eggs, milk, cinnamon, sugar, vanilla and applesauce. Mix well.
- 2. Soak bread one slice at a time until mixture is slightly absorbed.
- 3. Lightly spray or oil a skillet or griddle. Cook over medium heat until golden brown on both sides.
- 4. Serve hot.

Leftovers Don't Last Forever

Sometimes "leftover night" can be a fun game of take-your-pick for dinner! However, it might not end up so enjoyable if the food is no longer safe to eat.



Follow these tips for safe leftovers:

- Set your refrigerator temperature at 40F or below. When storing hot foods, store them in a shallow container no more than 2" deep, so that the food cools to 41F (or lower quickly).
- Follow the "4-Day Throw Away" rule: If the leftovers are not eaten on the fourth day after storing, throw them away!
- Leave a pean and sticky notes near the fridge. Label leftovers with the date when you prepared them.

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Saydel Singers Selected For All-State Choir

On Saturday, October 24, three SHS Choir members, Angela Pitt, Joe Peer and Megan Schmidt, placed dozens of hours of work over the last two months on the line when they auditioned to be part of the Iowa All-State Choir. To receive this honor is to achieve the highest choral award that an individual can receive in Iowa.

Their efforts were condensed into a seven minute audition where the stakes were high, and the nervousness perhaps higher. Combine that with the circumstance of auditioning against all of the Des Moines Metro 4A schools and it is easy to see how this truly is a monumental musical challenge.

The auditions were finished, and the anxious waiting to see if anyone would be selected or recalled for a second audition began. The lists were unrolled on the wall that is commonly referred to as the "wailing wall" among choir directors. The search for names ensued and was followed by the screams and tears of joy and disappointment.

What did the lists reveal? That for the first time in a decade, the odds were overcome, and Angela Pitt and Joe Peer found their names hanging from the banners of those accepted to the Iowa All-State Chorus. The last SHS choir member to receive this honor was Nick Wilson in 2005.

Mr. Puffett said that as a director, the greatest reward is seeing how each of the singers grew as musicians as they vigorously tackled the choral literature to achieve a depth of understanding that is typically not possible in Concert Choir.

Thanks to all who auditioned for their extensive and intense efforts and congratulations to Angela Pitt and Joe Peer who will be traveling to the All-State Music Festival on November 20 and 21. For those unable to make the concert, the festival broadcast can be seen on IPTV November 26 at 7:00 PM.

The Classroom Extends Beyond the Walls of SHS

Students in Mrs. Austin's Psychology class and Mr. Alons' Sociology class participated with young people in a nationwide conversation on mental health through Text, Talk, Act. Through text messaging, small groups received discussion questions that led them through a conversation about mental health. The goal of Text, Talk, Act is to bring people together in order to engage in a dialogue about mental health, to eliminate misconceptions, and offer resources for assisting friends in need.

Saydel Community School Food Services

You may have heard some information about the requirements for school meals. These requirements help the Saydel Community School District build on the work we are already doing to provide more fruits, vegetables, whole grains and healthier entrées in our school cafeterias.

Some of the New Requirements Include:

- Increasing the amount of fruits and vegetables
- Reducing the sodium in meals over the next 10 years
- Setting calorie limits for the first time
- Increasing whole grains

A study led by Dr. Craig Johnston, assistant professor at the USDA/ARS Children's Nutrition Research Center at Baylor College of Medicine, compared food in lunches brought from home versus those offered in the school cafeteria. The study was published in a recent issue of *Childhood Obesity* and discovered that kids who choose the school lunch had healthier foods on their trays compared to the foods that were found in their home lunches.
